## Nationwide Crime Analysis

May  
2021 vs 2020

Preliminary figures for May 2021 indicate that major crimes increased by 8% with 363 cases, compared to 336 in 2020. There were regional increases in New Providence and the Grand Bahama District at rates of 7% and 25% respectively, compared to 2020. The Family Islands District crimes remain unchanged.

Crimes against the person increased by 84%, with 68 incidents, compared to 37 in 2020. There was a 103% increase in New Providence, a 75% decrease in Grand Bahama and a 100% increase in the Family Islands. Property crimes decreased by 1%, with 295 incidents, compared to 299 in 2020. There was a 15% decrease in New Providence, a 42% increase in Grand Bahama and a 4% decrease in the Family Islands.

**Homicides** decreased by 25% with 6 incidents, compared to 8 over the same period in 2020. Of this total, all murders were recorded in New Providence. The murder solvency rate for the period stands at 33%. Victims between the ages of 18 and 35 represented 66% of all homicides, which currently stands at 47. This figure represents a 52% increase over the same period in 2020 when 31 murders were recorded. Based on preliminary figures, homicides were more likely to occur on a Monday than any other day of the week. Homicides were more prevalent in the **Northeastern Division**, accounting for 26% of the overall total. Firearms were used to commission 40 homicides, and fatal gunshot wounds remain the leading cause of death for homicides.

**Armed robberies** increased by 200% with 39 incidents, compared to 13 over the same period in 2020. Armed robberies were more prevalent in the **South Central Division**, accounting for 26% of the overall total for the year, which stands at 154. This figure represents a 41% increase over the same period in 2020 when 109 incidents were recorded. Based on preliminary figures, armed robberies were more likely to occur on a Thursday than any other day of the week and these incidents peak at night between the hours of 6pm and 10pm. Most armed robberies occurred at the street level and business establishments respectively. Firearms continue to be the weapon of choice for the commission of armed robberies. Males represented the highest percentage of victims at 64%, compared to female victims at 36%.

**Robberies** increased by 67% with 5 incidents, compared to 3 over the same period in 2020. Based on preliminary figures, robberies were more likely to occur on a Wednesday than any other day of the week and these incidents peak between the hours of 1pm and 3pm. Robberies were more prevalent in the **Southwestern Division**, accounting for 18% of the overall total for the year, which stands at 45. Males represented the highest percentage of victims at 77%, compared to female victims at 23%.

**Stolen vehicles** increased by 150% with 25 incidents, compared to 10 over the same period in 2020. **Nissans** and **Hondas** were the most targeted vehicles of choice, representing 36% and 24% respectively of all vehicles stolen. However, the Toyota Passo was the predominant vehicle model, representing 15% of all vehicles stolen. Residences were the most targeted locations and the **Southwestern Division** accounted for the majority of reported stolen vehicles at 15%. Thirty-six percent of stolen vehicles in May were recovered. Simultaneously, 27% of vehicles stolen were recovered for the year.

**Stealing from vehicles** decreased by 39% with 80 incidents, compared to 132 over the same period in 2020. The most frequent items stolen included personal effects, cash and electronics. Nissan Notes and Cubes were the most targeted vehicles for this crime. Based on preliminary figures, stealing from vehicles were more likely to occur on a Monday than any other day of the week. Stealing from vehicle cases were mostly reported in the **Southwestern Division**, accounting for 15% of recorded matters.

**Housebreakings** increased by 58% with 57 incidents, compared to 36 over the same period in 2020. **New Providence District** accounted for 37 or 65% of housebreakings, most of which occurred in the **Eastern Division** with 9 incidents. **Grand Bahama, including Abaco and Bimini**, accounted for 14 or 25% of housebreakings. The **Family Islands District** accounted for the remaining 6 or 10%, most of which occurred in Cat Island with 3 incidents. For the year, **New Providence District** accounted for 159 or 60% of all housebreakings, **Grand Bahama, including Abaco and Bimini**, accounted for 59 or 22% of housebreakings, while the **Family Islands District** accounted for the remaining 47 or 18%.

For the period in review, a total of 21 **firearms** and 351 rounds of ammunition were discovered and/or seized throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. As a result, 17 persons were charged with possession of illegal firearms. Additionally, **ShotSpotter** detected 77 gunshot incidents, consisting of 53 multiple shots and 24 single shot incidents, totalling 314 rounds discharged.

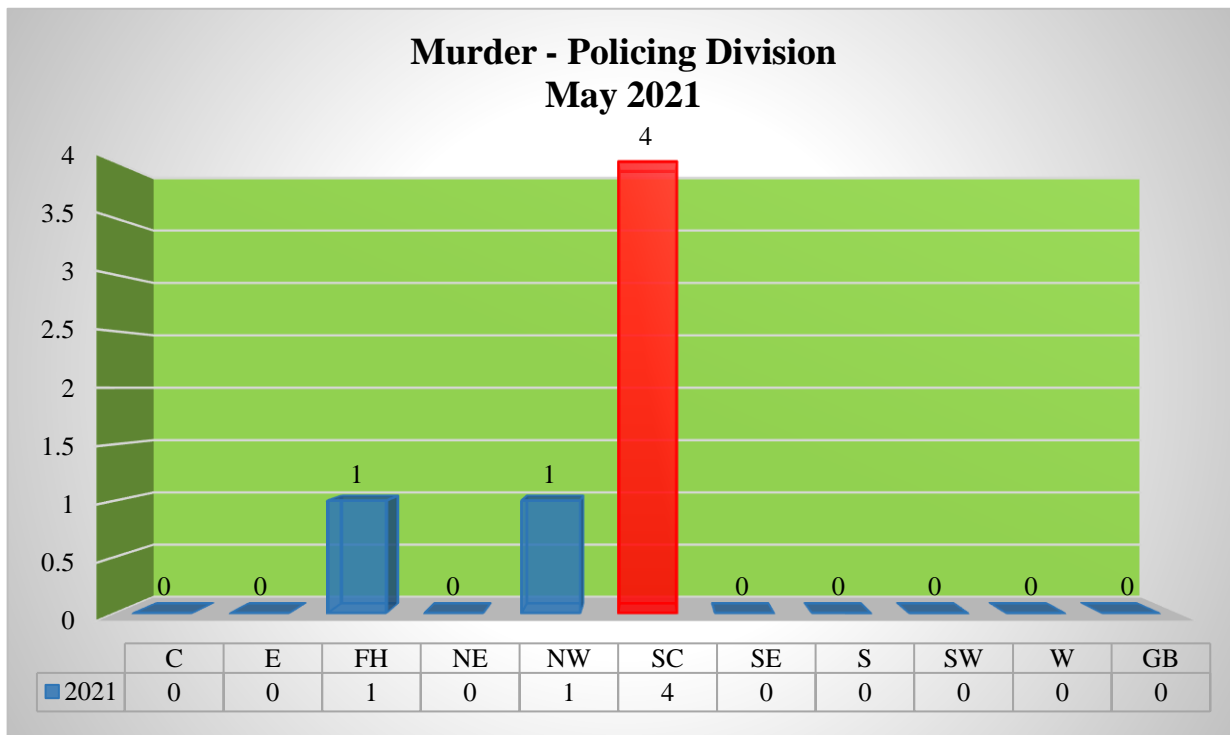
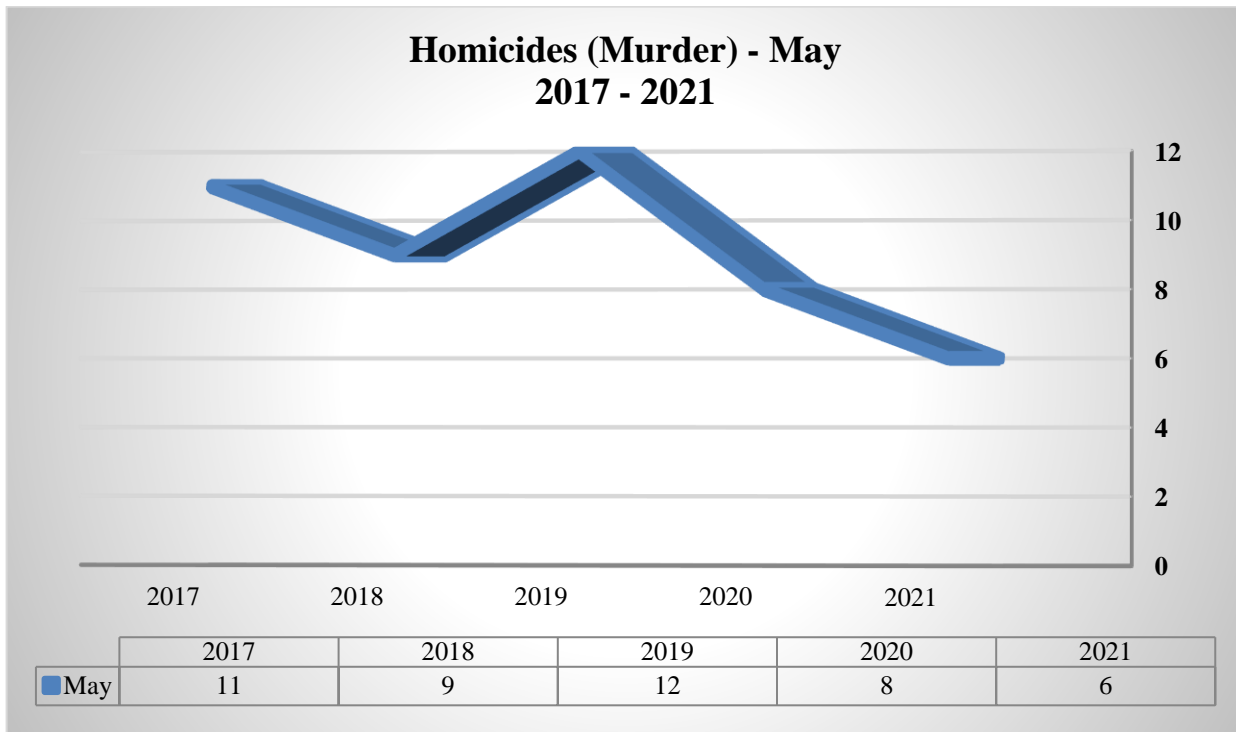
There were 346 breaches to the Emergency Powers Order, including 128 curfew violations and 218 other breaches. The Force also responded to 6 Covid 19 calls for assistance. Furthermore, the Royal Bahamas Police Force officers conducted 1,127 field check patrols, 63 road checks and executed 61 warrants of arrest throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. As a result of these efforts, 1,112 persons were arrested. Of this number, 36% or 395 suspects were charged before the Court. There were 314 convictions in the Magistrates Court, 2 acquittals, 62 matters were discharged and 37 matters were withdrawn by the virtual complainant.

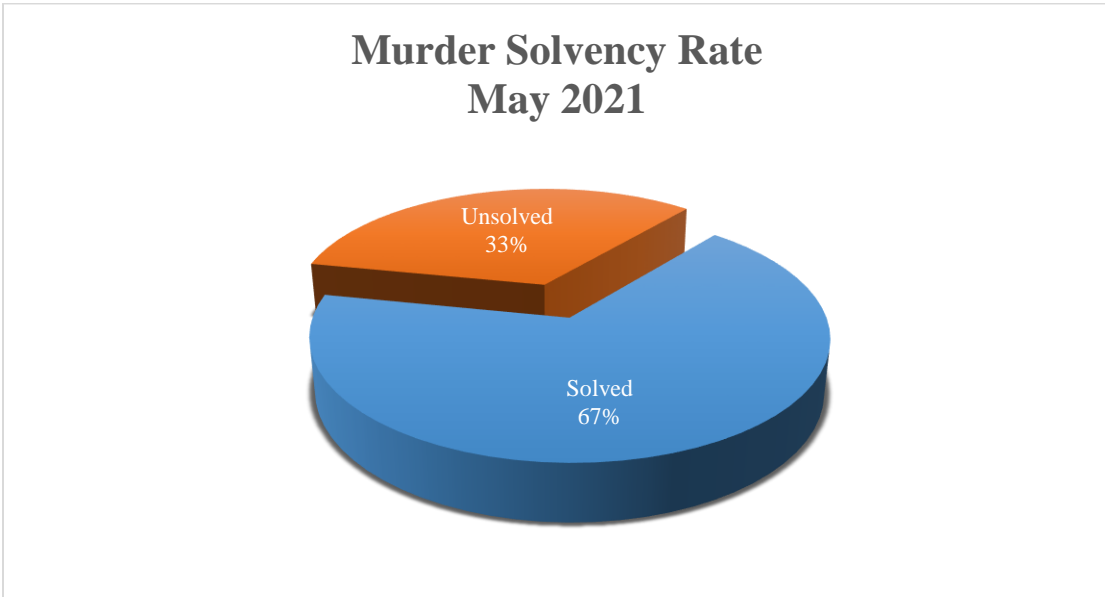
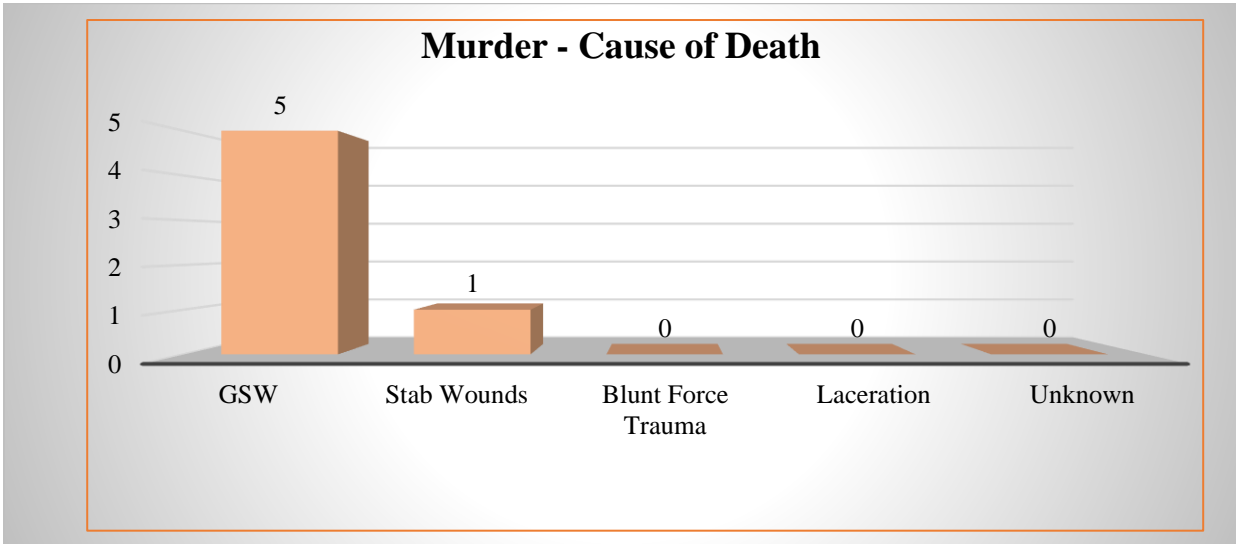
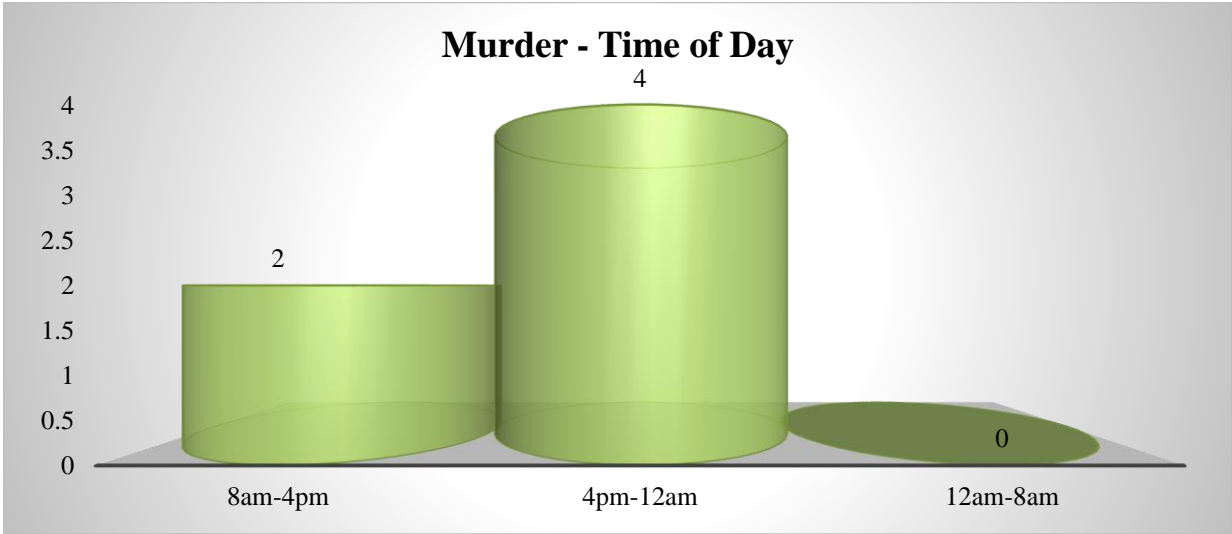
## Murder

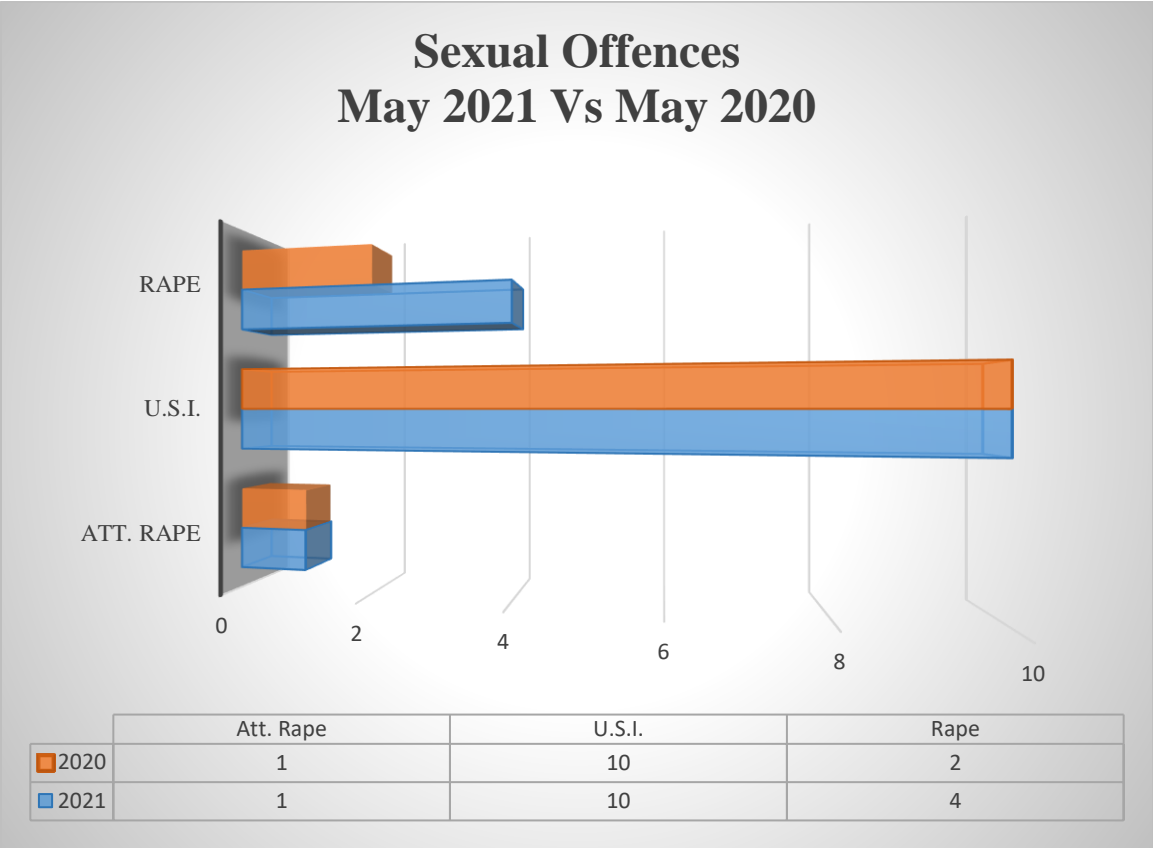

**Sexual Offences**

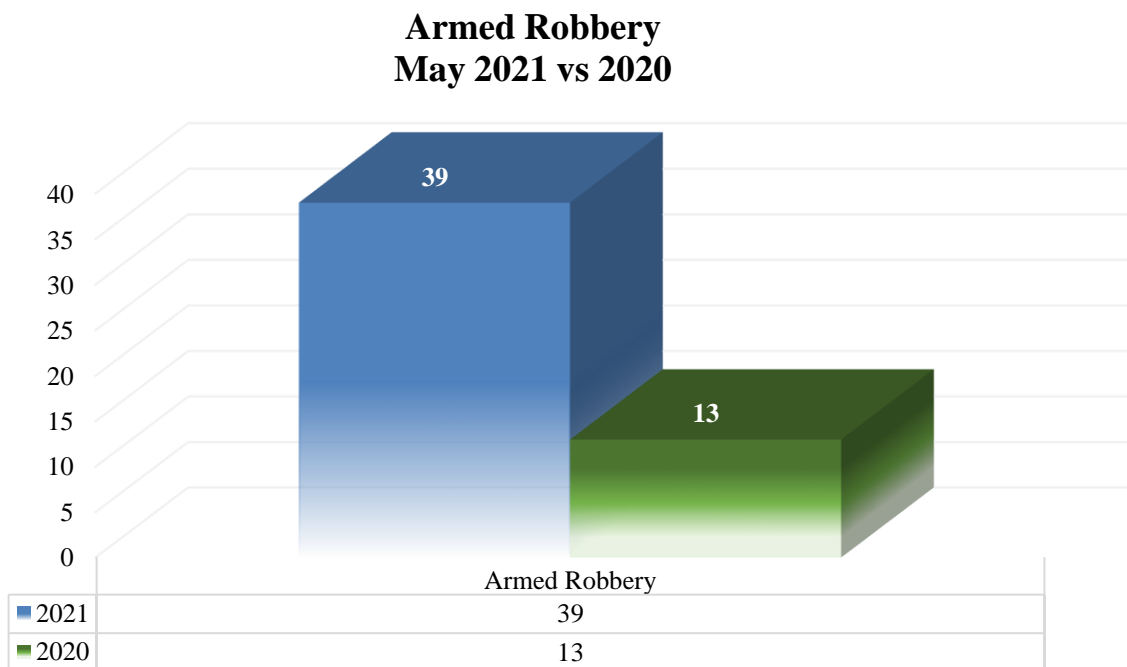

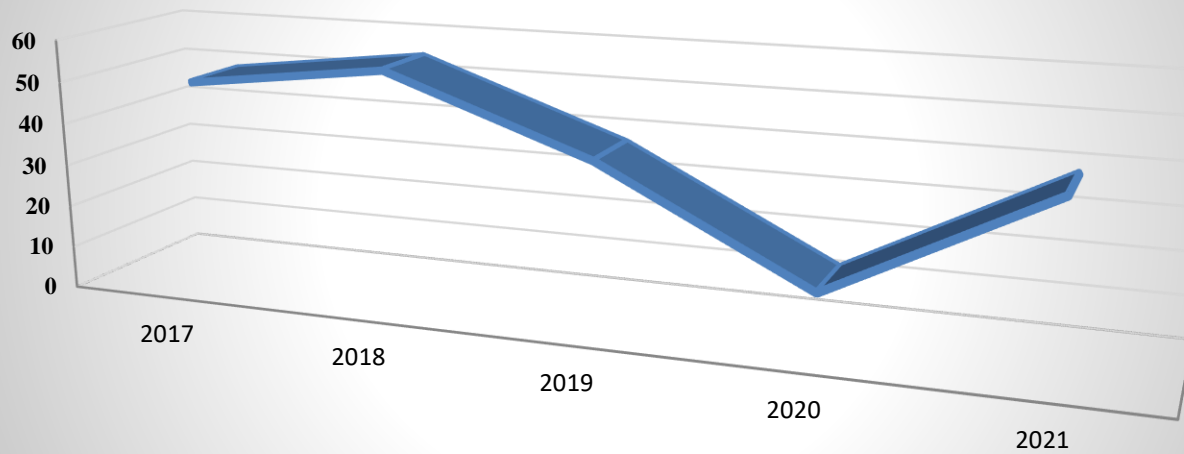

For the period in review, armed robberies increased by 200% with 39 incidents, compared to 13 in 2020.

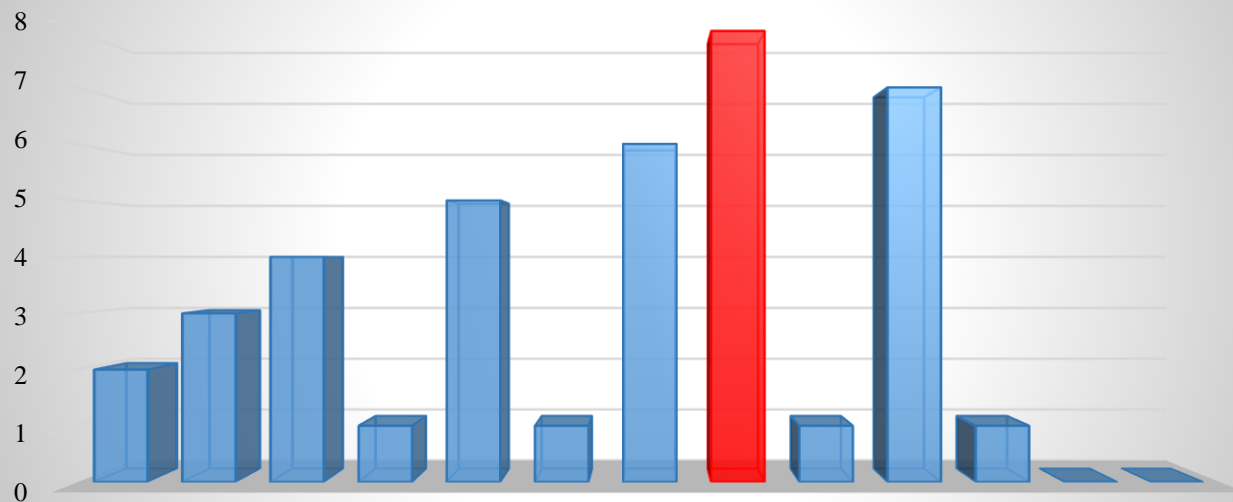


### Armed Robbery May 2017 - 2021



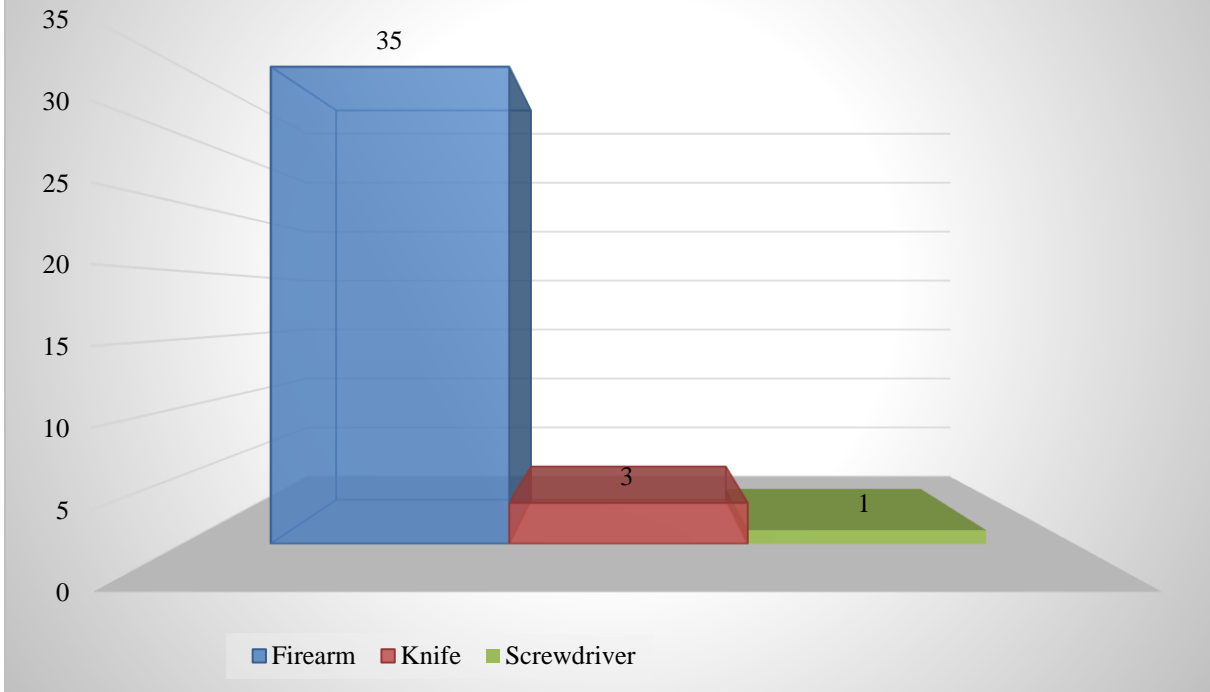

### Armed Robbery - Police Division May 2021

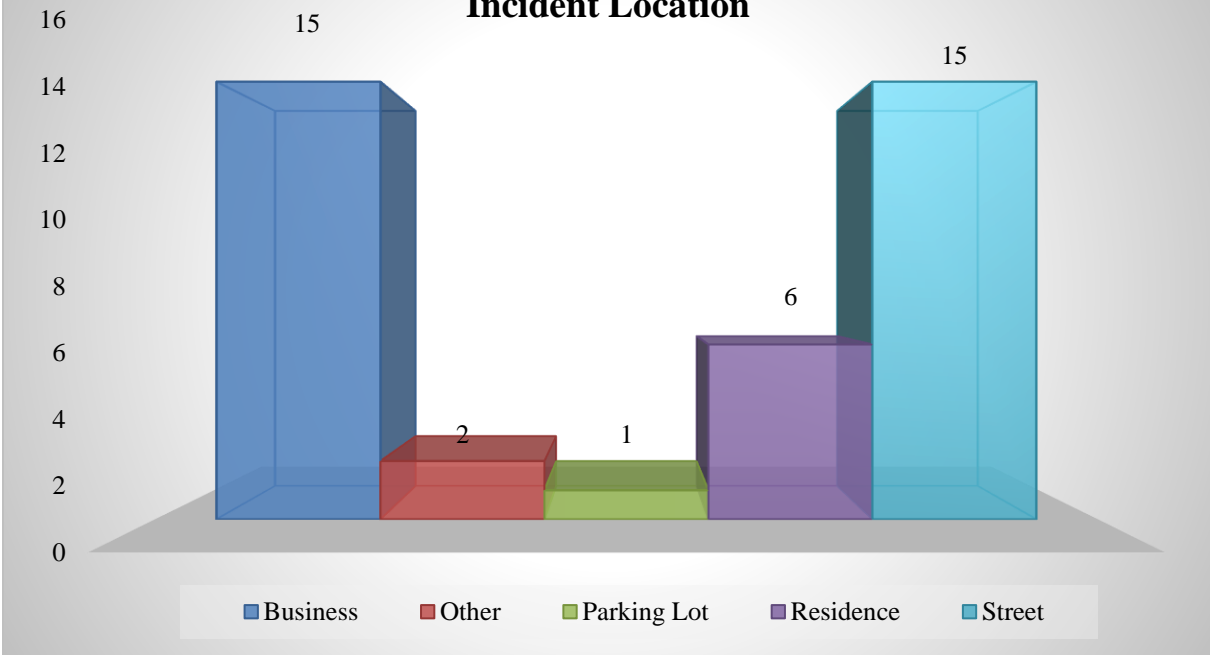


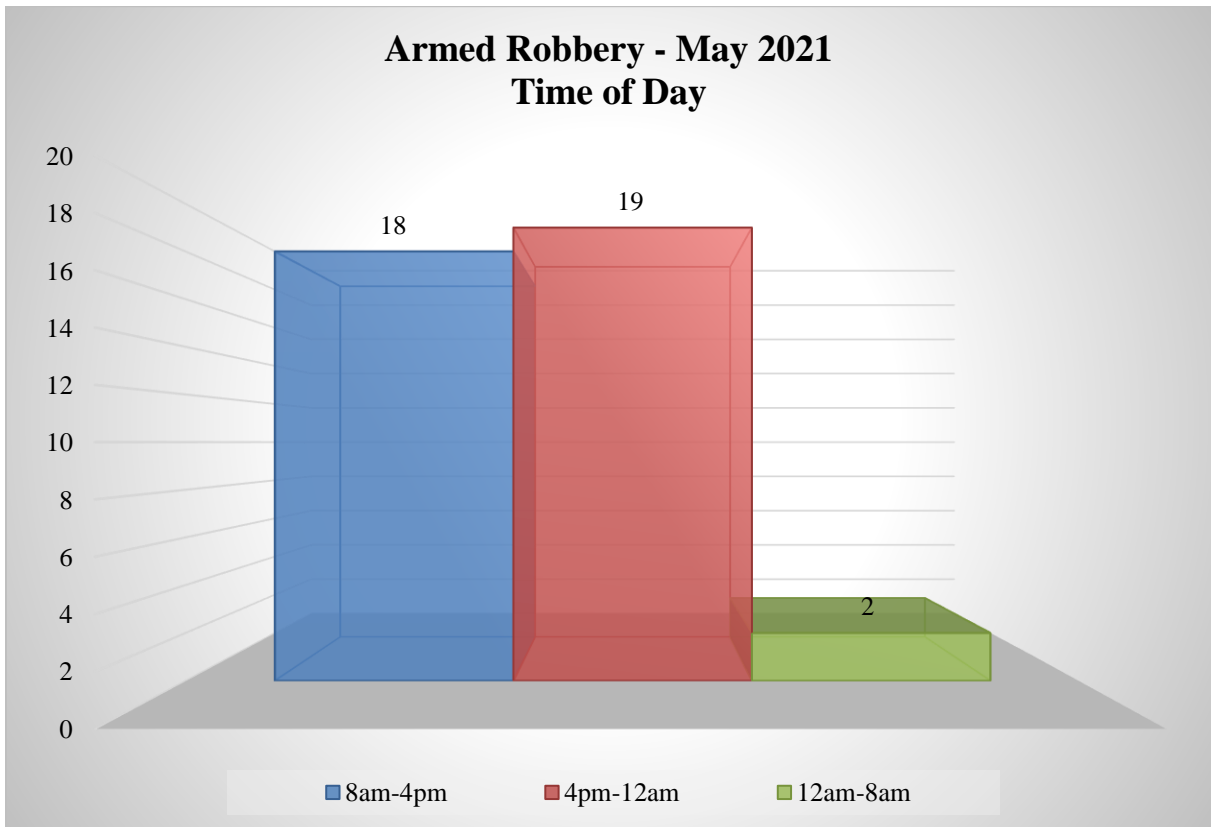

### Armed Robbery - May 2021 Incident Location

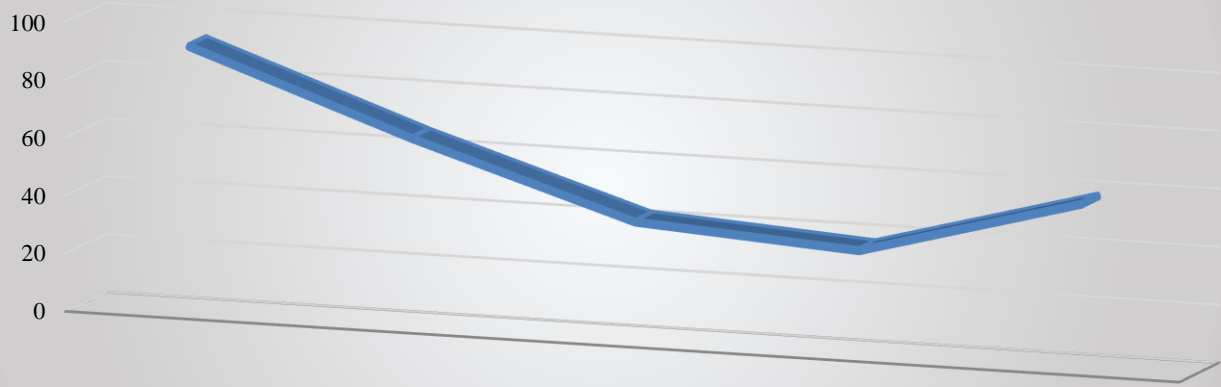




### Housebreakings

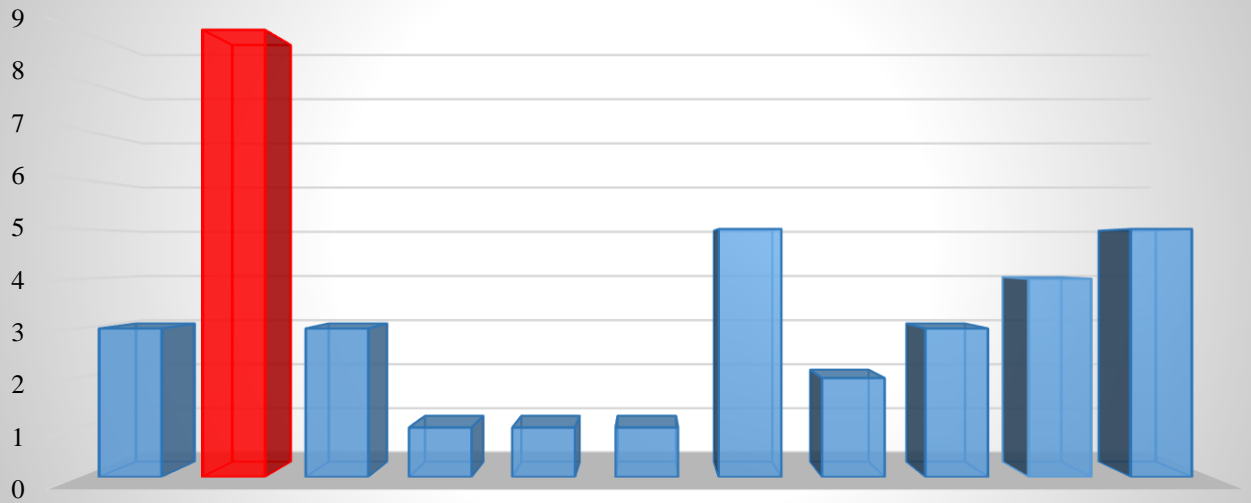

### Housebreaking May 2017 - 2021



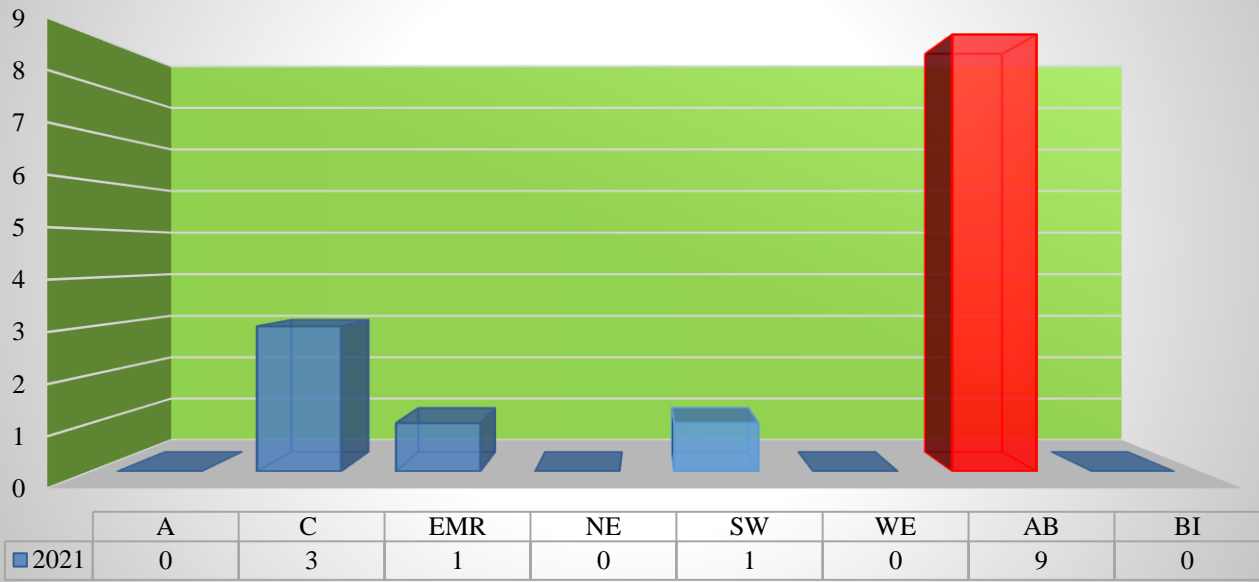

### Housebreaking - May 2021 New Providence District

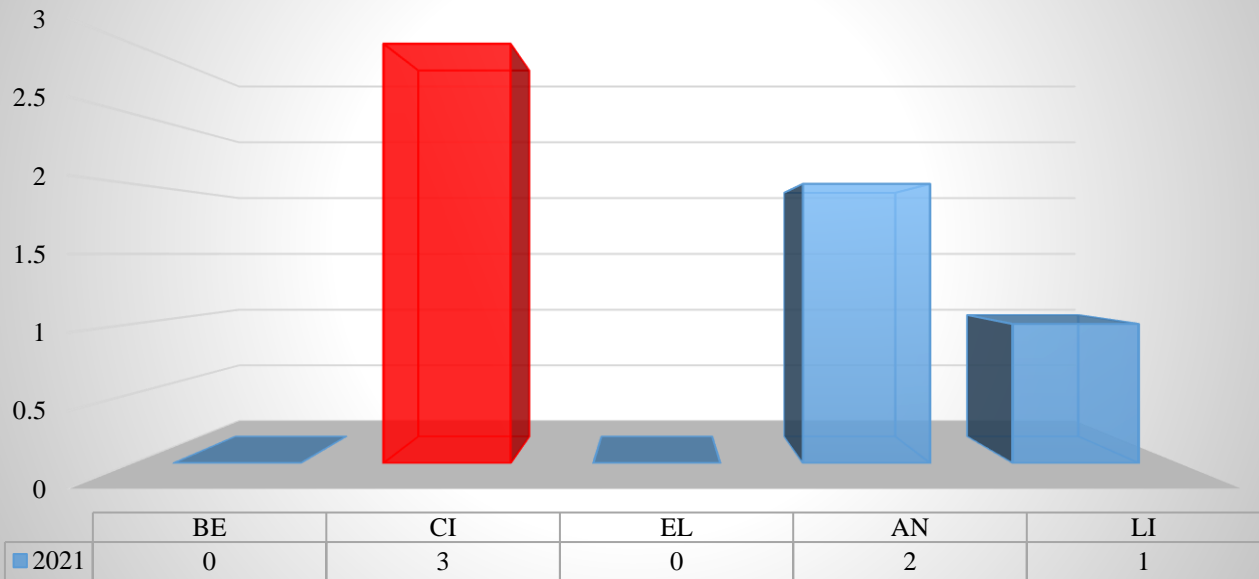

### Housebreaking - May 2021 Grand Bahama District



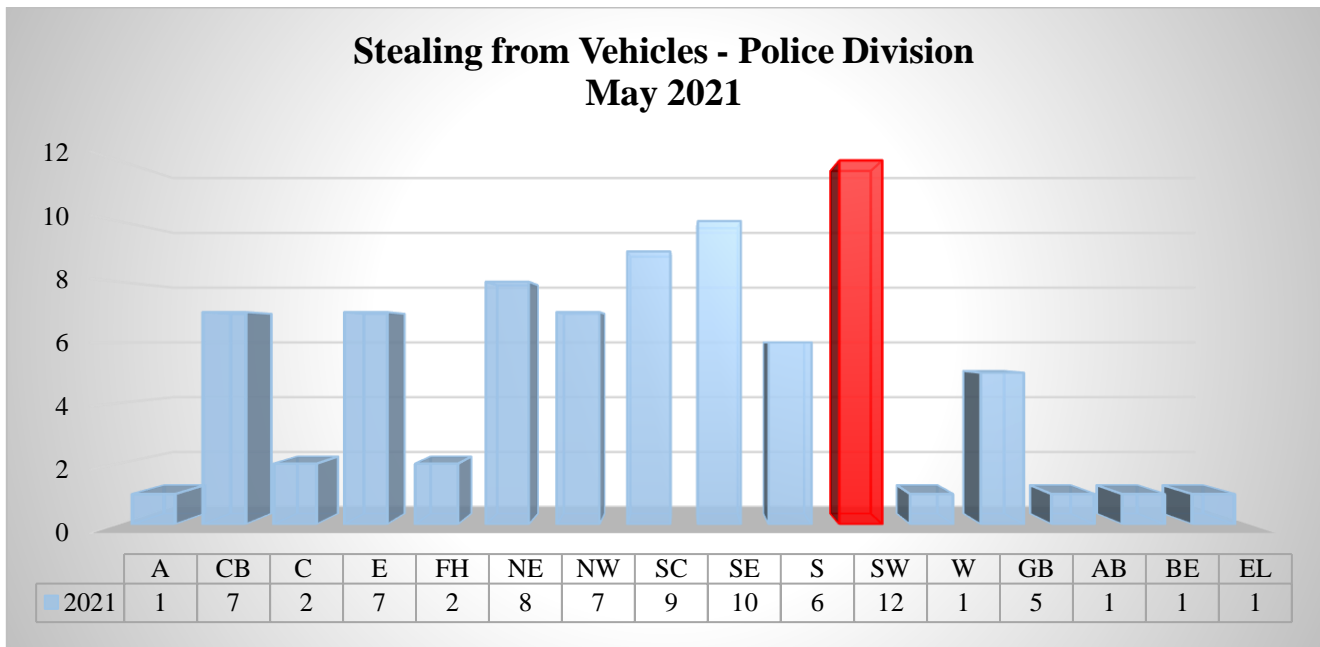
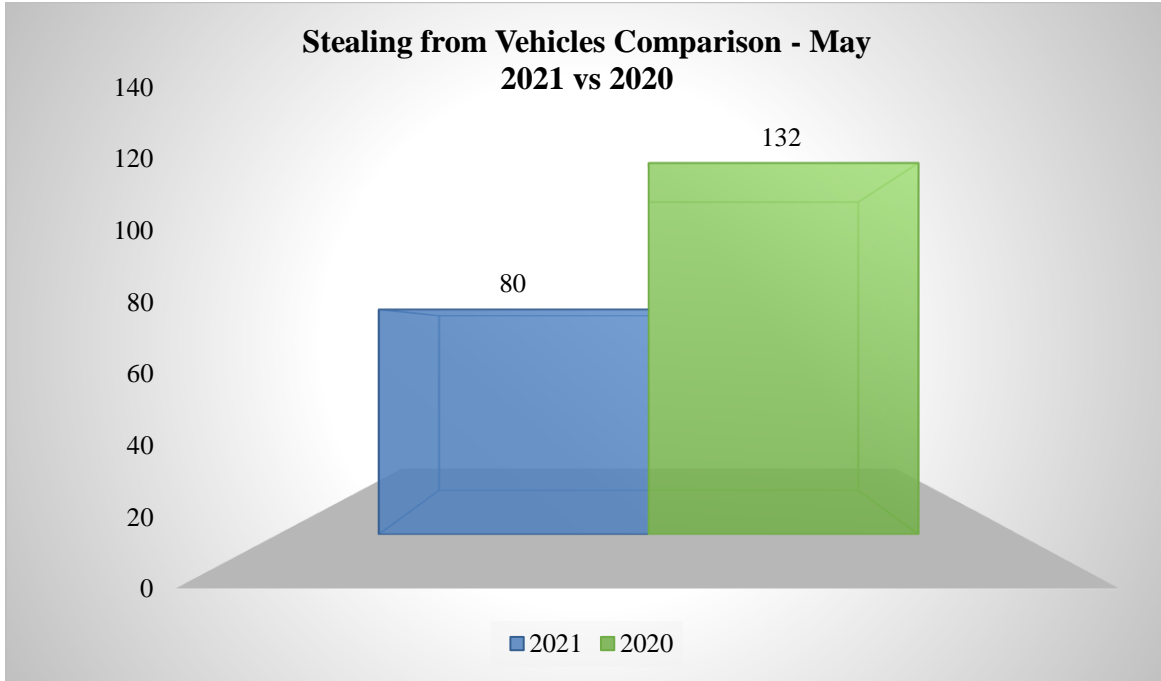
### Housebreaking - May 2021 Family Islands District



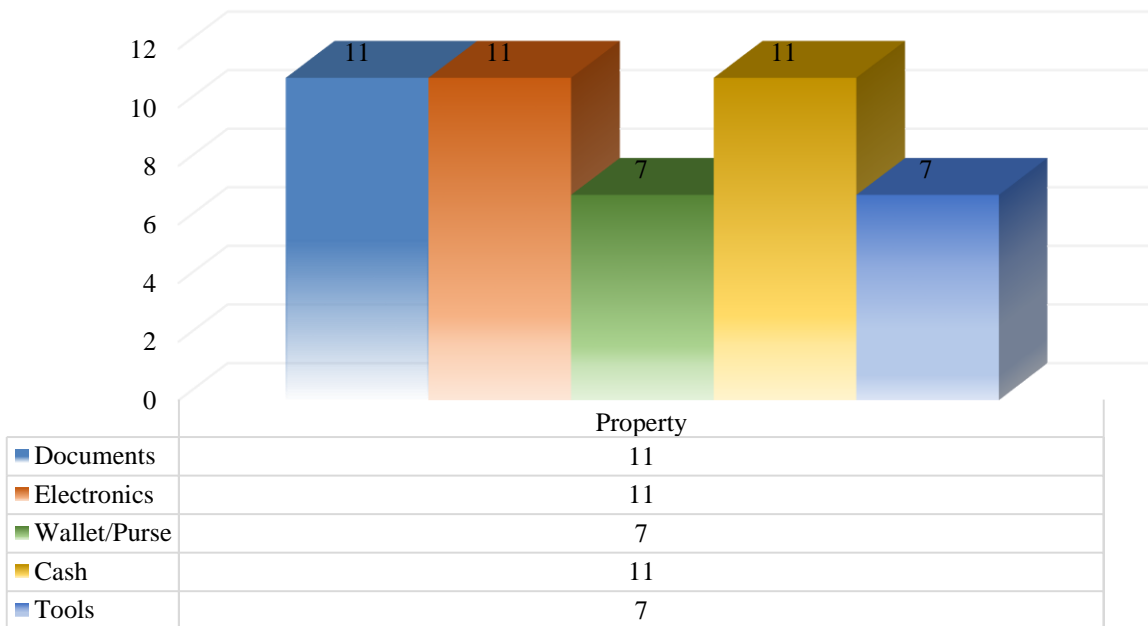


## Stealing from Vehicle

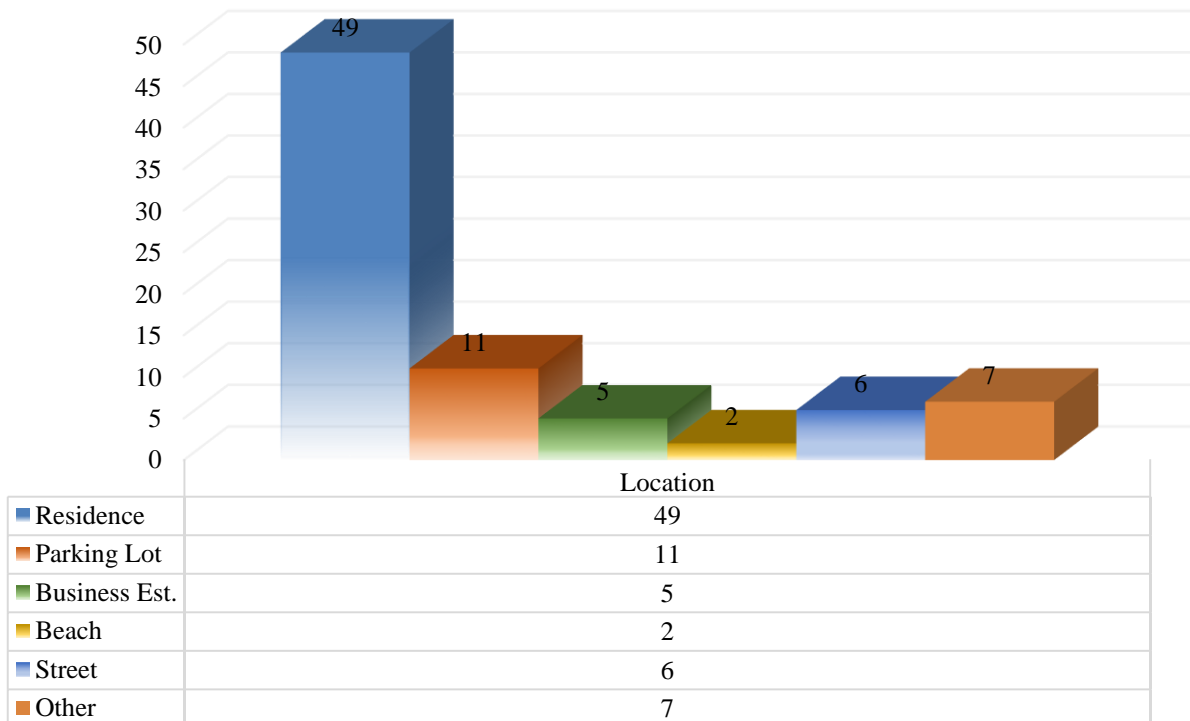
For the month of May 2021, stealing from a vehicle decreased by 39% with 80 incidents, compared to 132 over the same period in 2020. Items of choice stolen from vehicles mostly consisted of electronics, documents and cash. Residences were the most targeted areas for this crime representing 61% of stealing incidents. Stealing from vehicles mostly occurred with the Southwestern Division.



### Stealing from Vehicle - Items Stolen May 2021



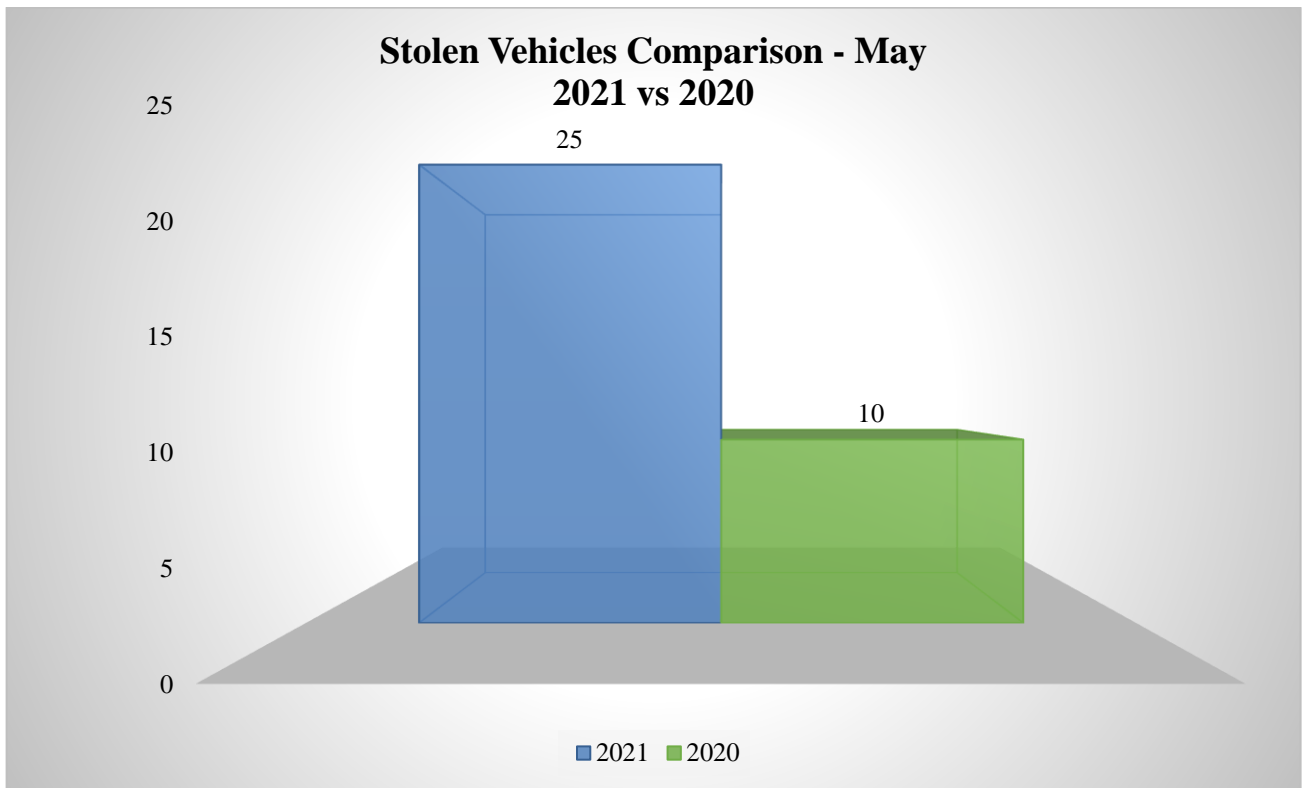
### Stealing from Vehicle - Location Type May 2021



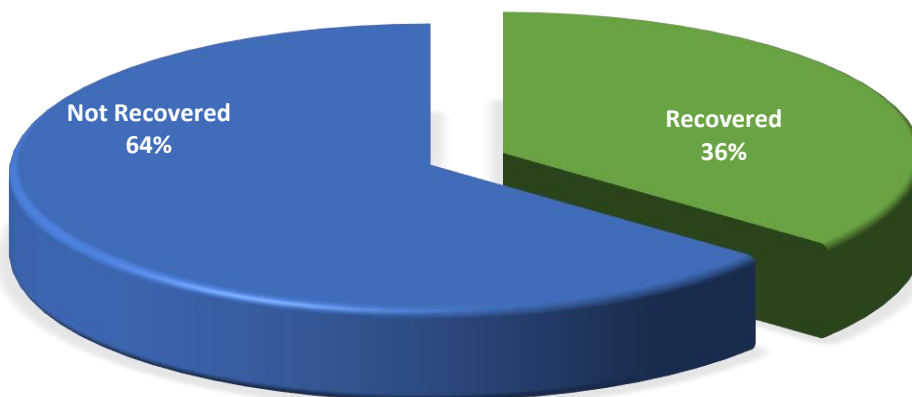

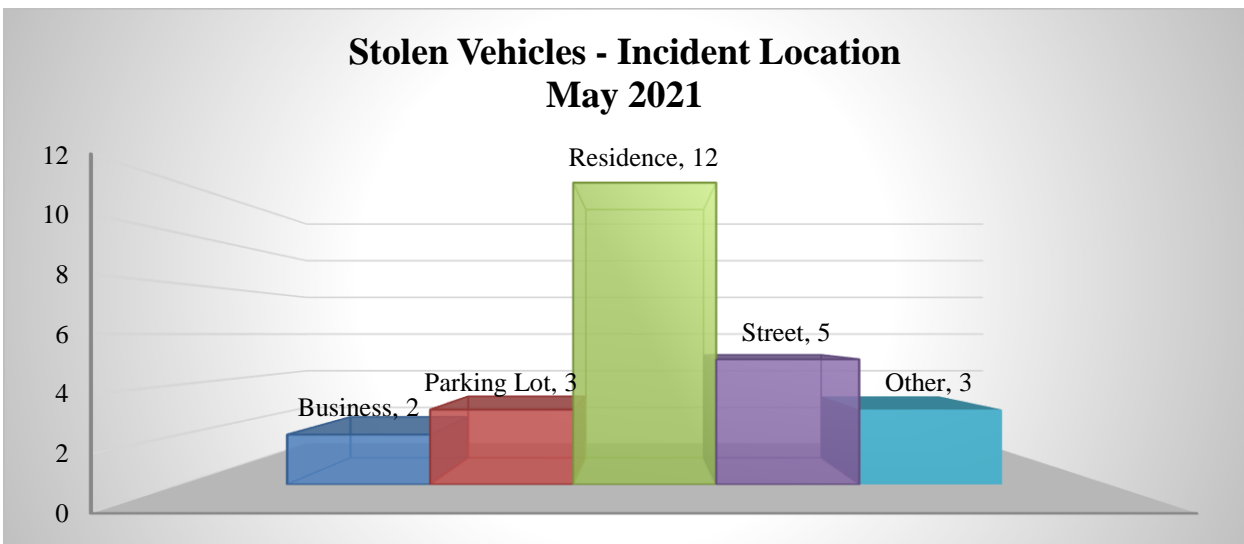
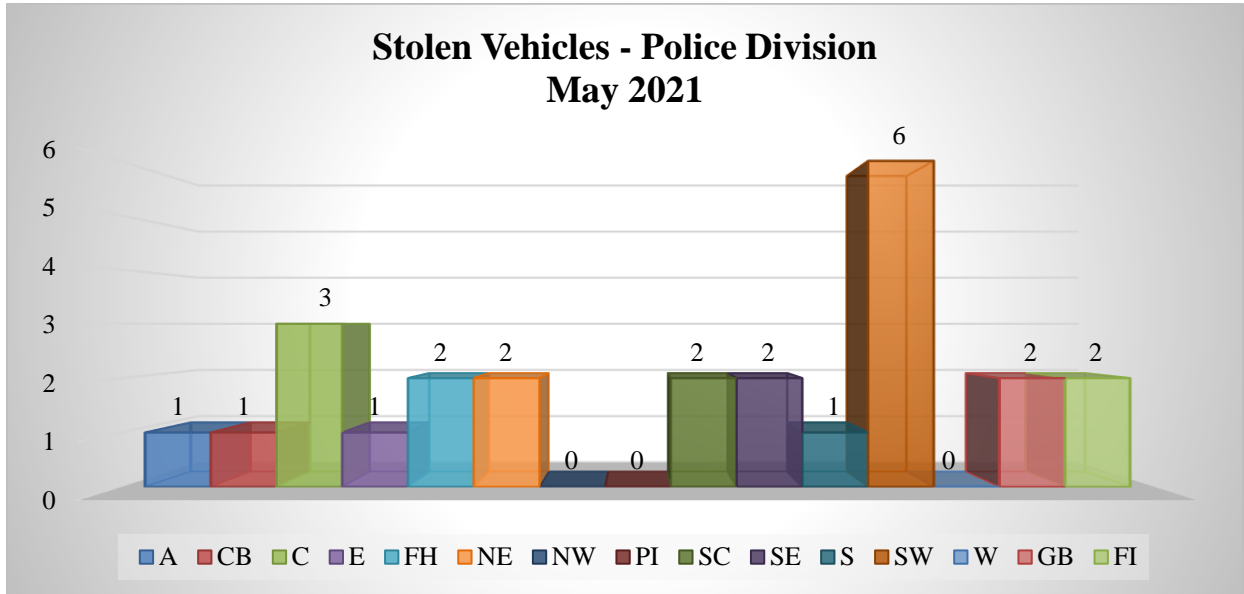
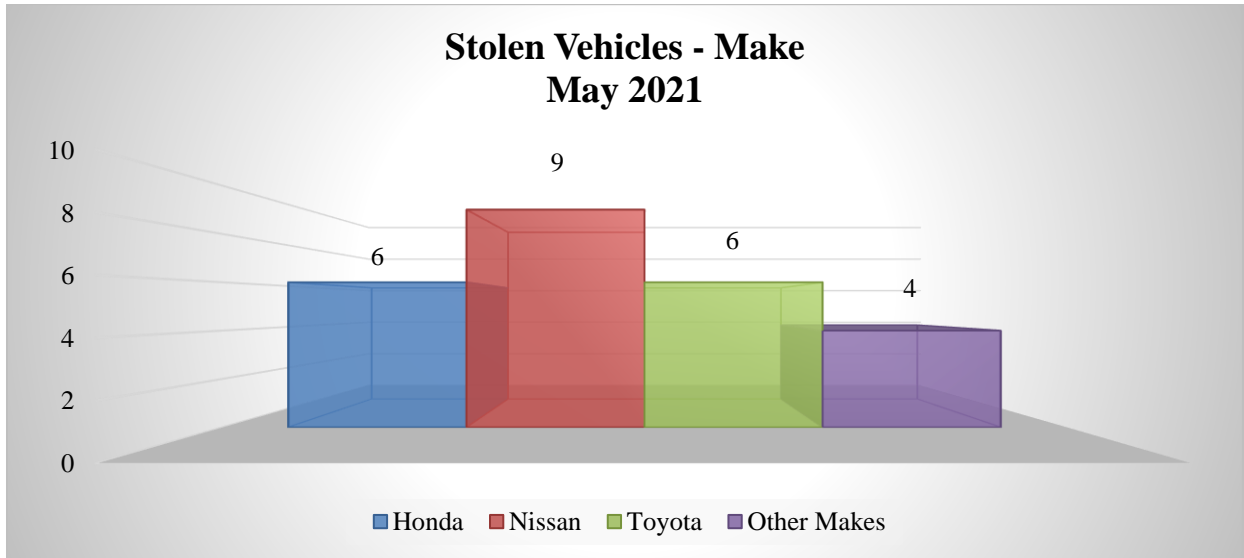
## Stolen Vehicle

In May 2021, stolen vehicles increased by 150% with 25 incidents, compared to 10 over the same period in 2020. 9 or 36% of vehicles stolen for the month were recovered.

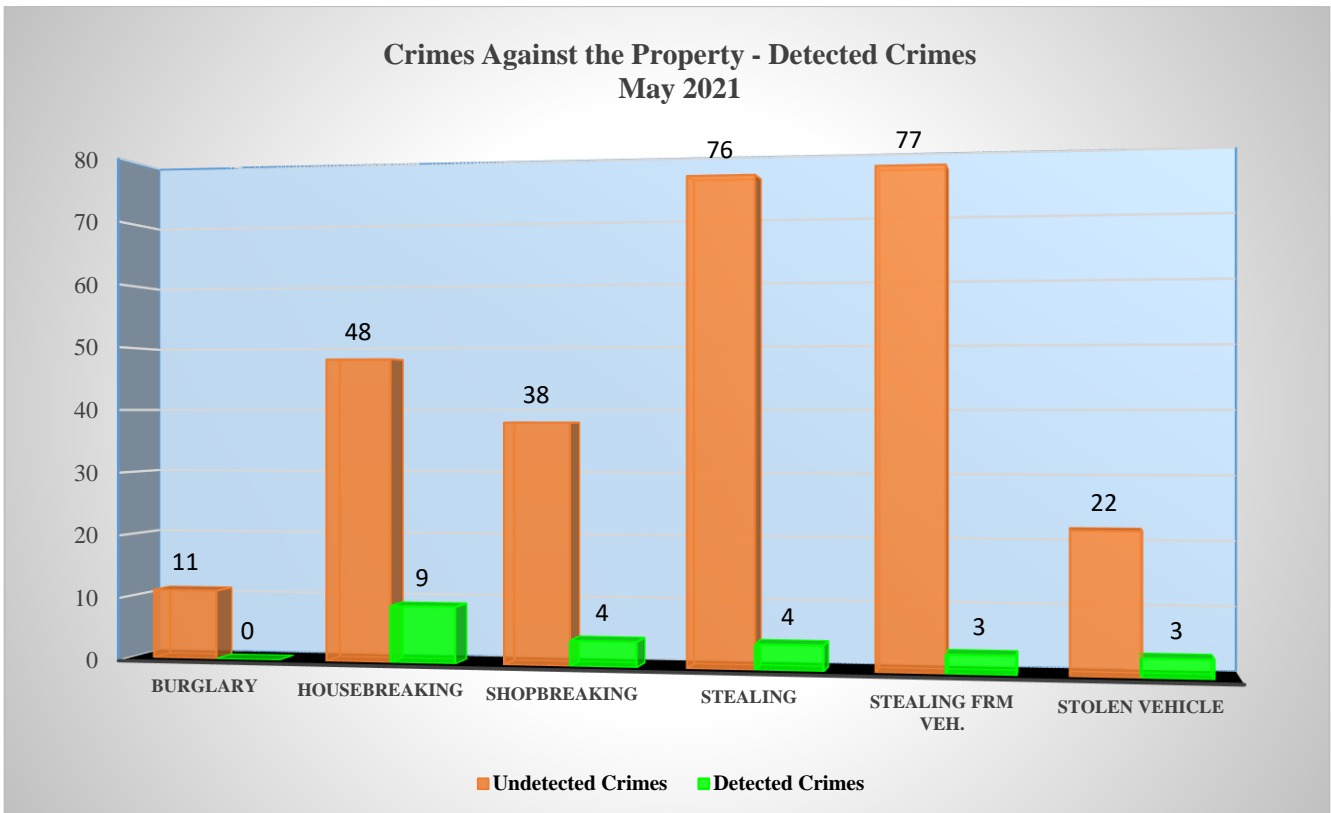
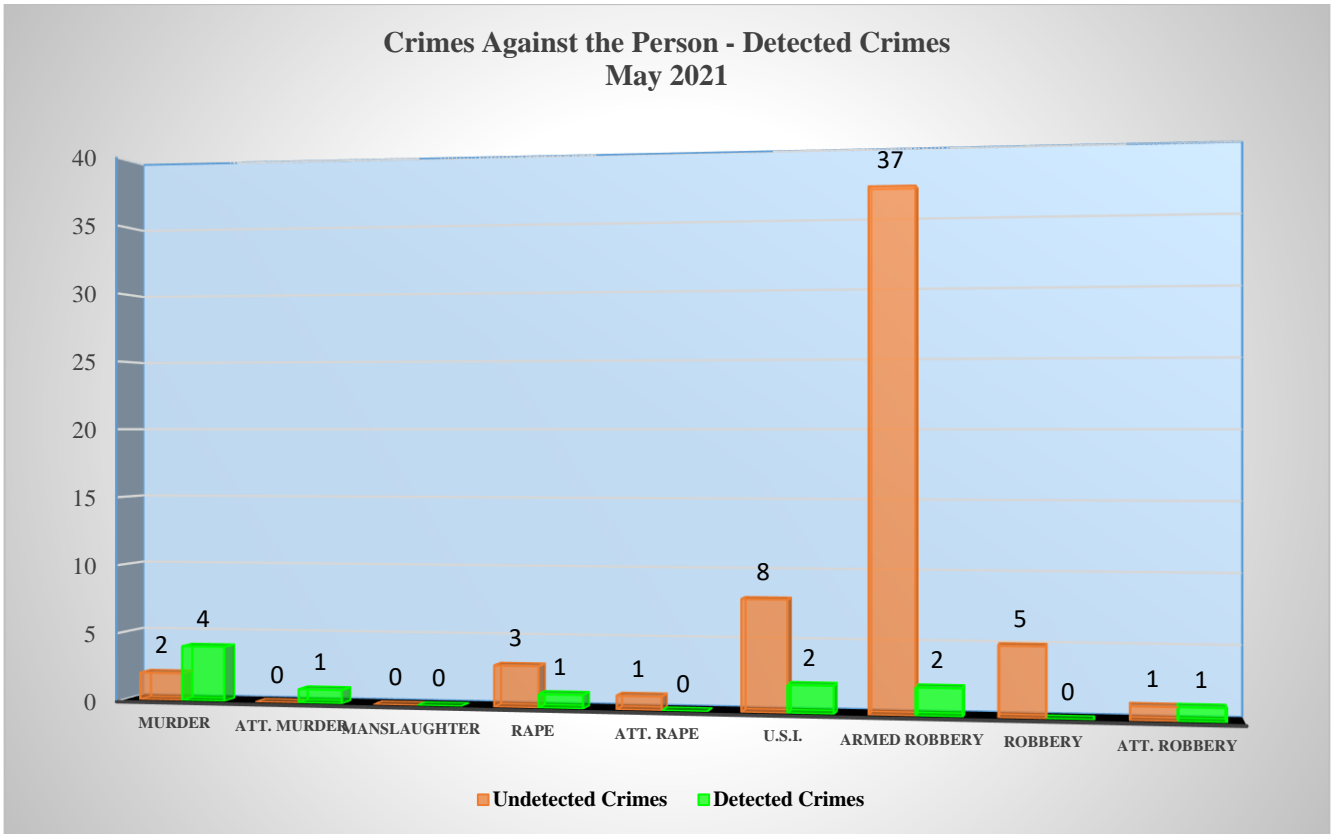

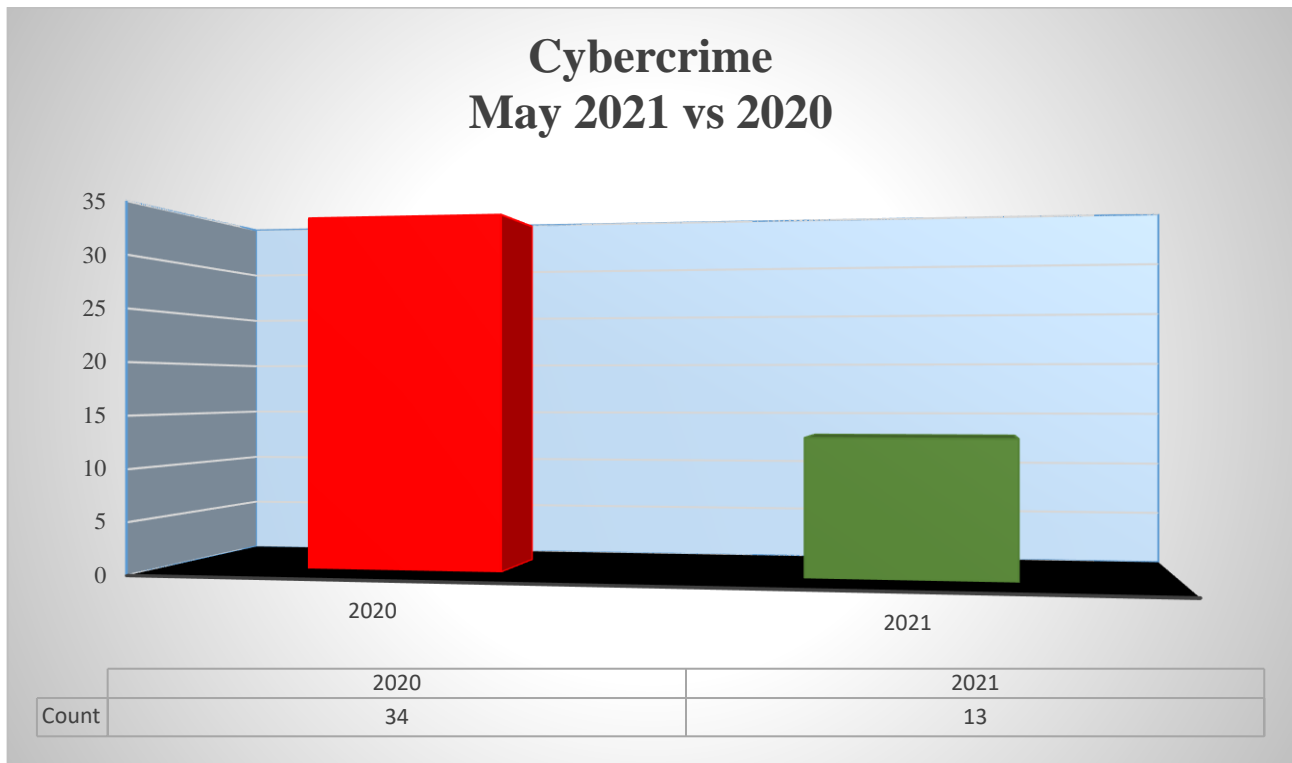
**Detection Rates - All Bahamas

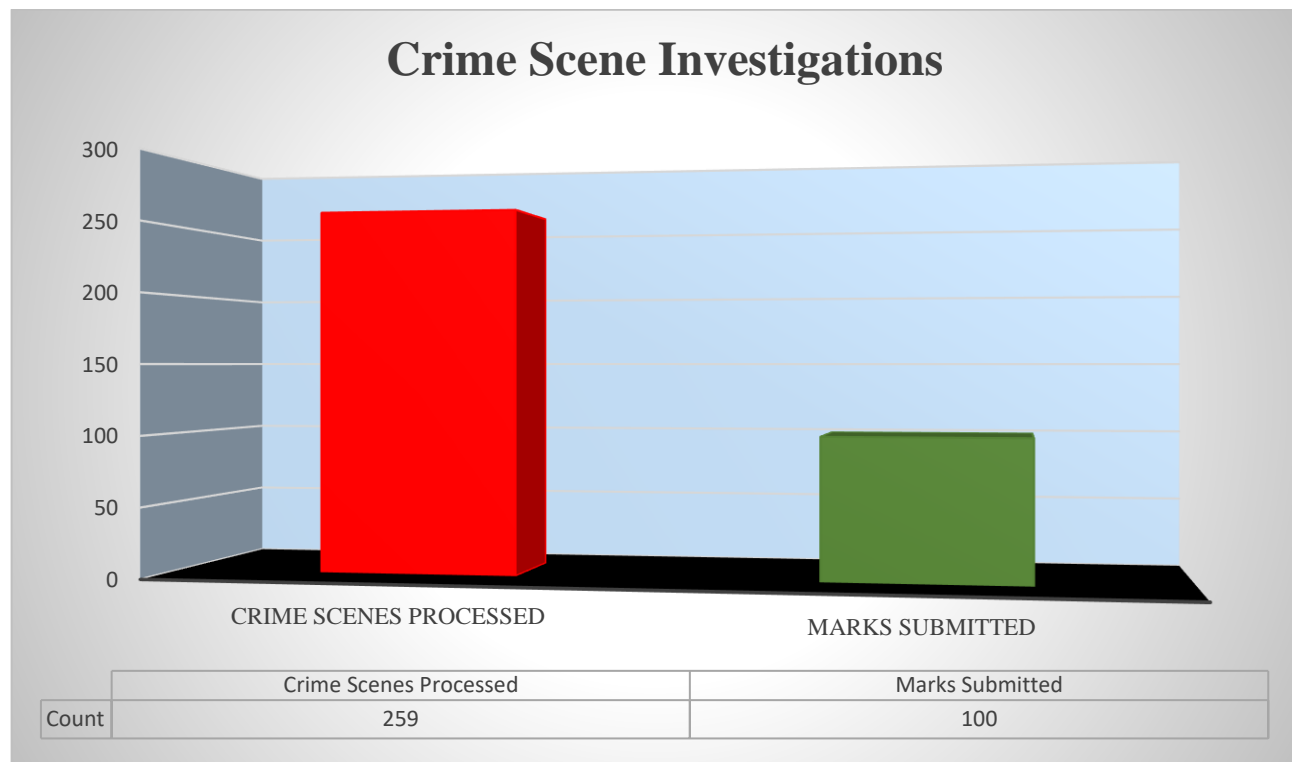
## Cybercrime

## Persons Arrested

For the month of May, the police arrested 1,112 persons for various major and minor offences throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. **New Providence** accounted for 940 or 85% of all persons arrested and the **Grand Bahama & the Northern Bahamas** accounted for 172 or 15%. There were no arrests recorded in the **Family Islands**. Males accounted for 1,094 or 98% of arrests, and females accounted for the remaining 18 or 2% of arrests.



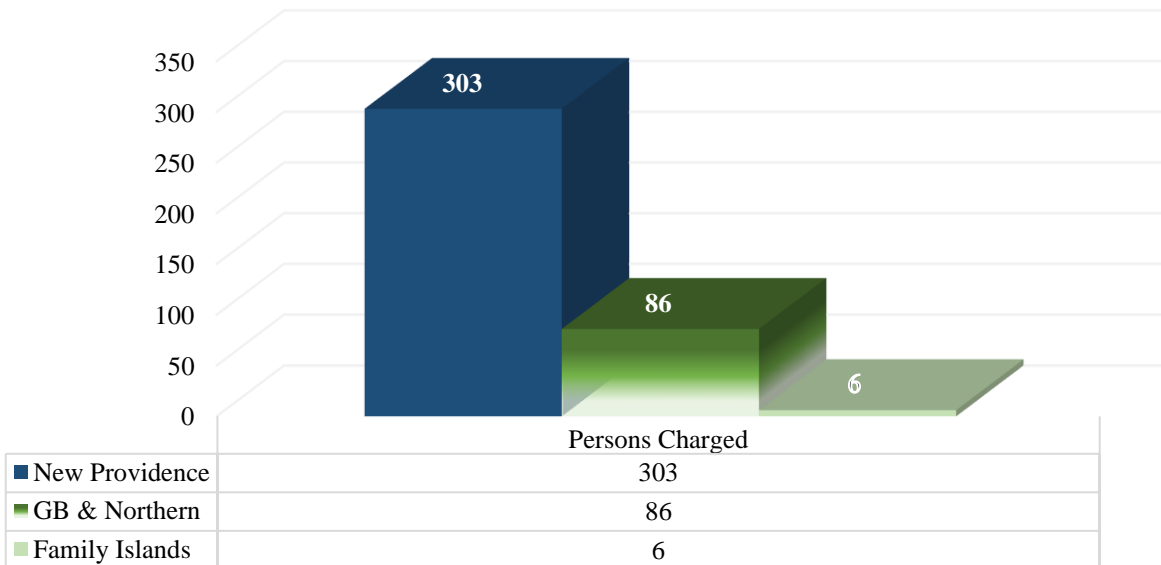

### Persons Charged

For the period in review, the police charged 395 persons for various major and minor offences throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. **New Providence** accounted for 303 or 77% of all persons charged, **Grand Bahama & the Northern Bahamas** accounted for 86 or 22%, and the **Family Islands District** accounted for 6 or 1%. ### Charged - District

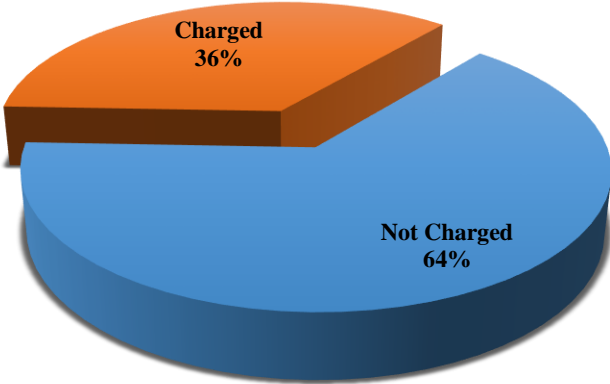

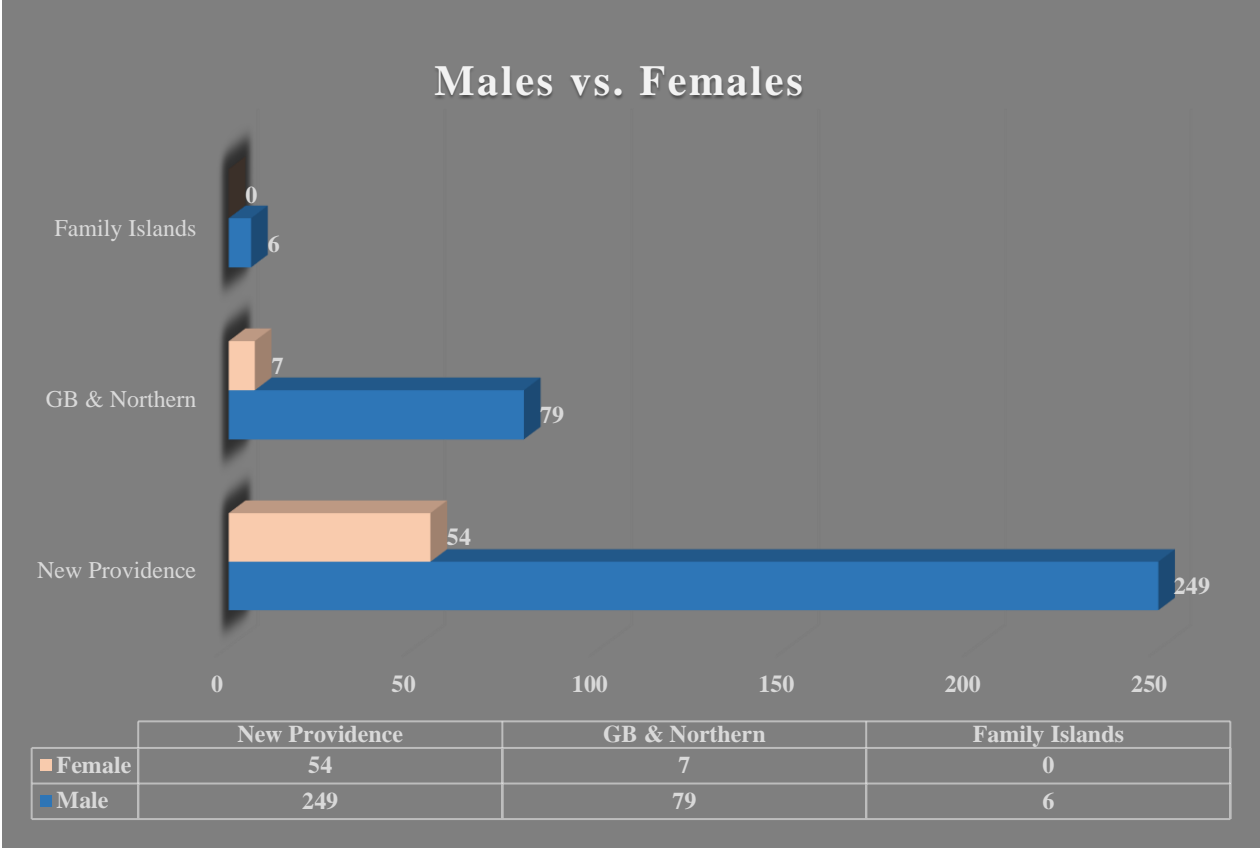

### % Persons Charged

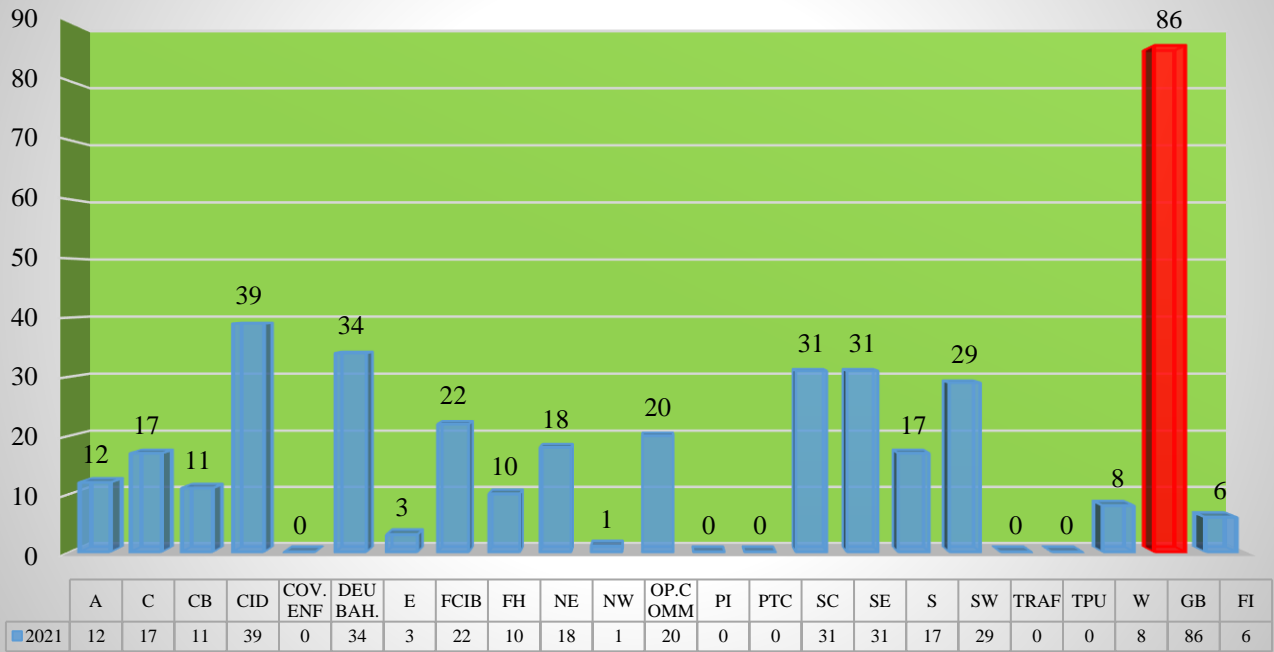


### Males vs. Females



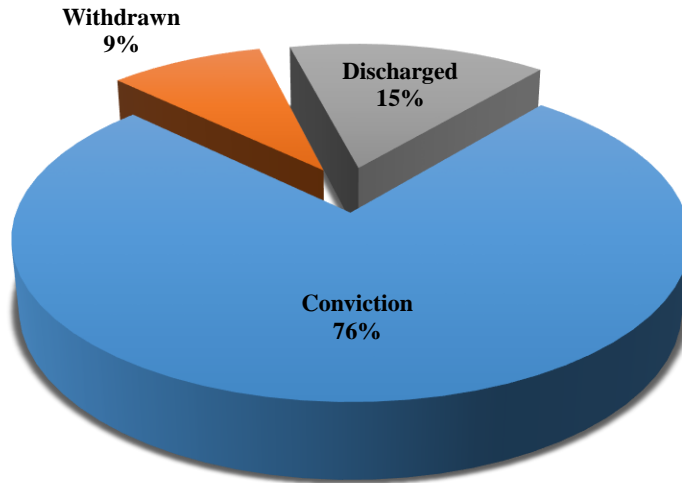

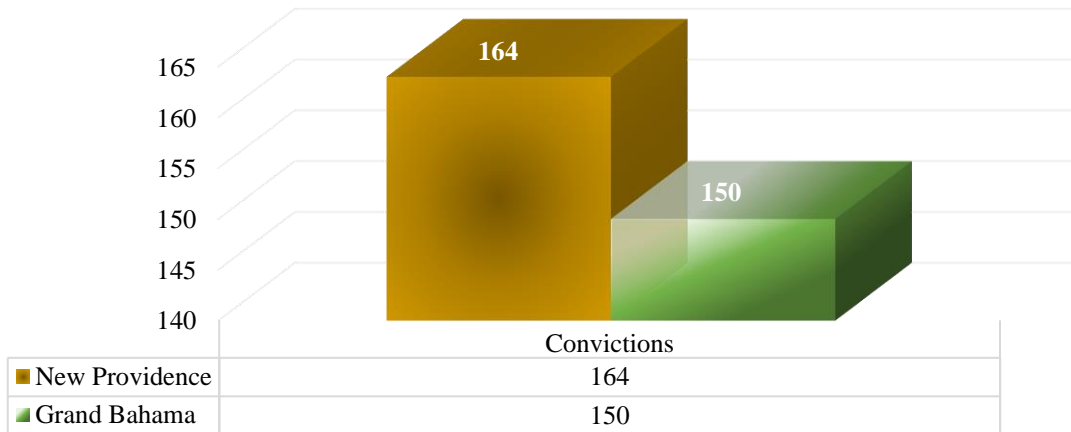


### Court Case Disposition

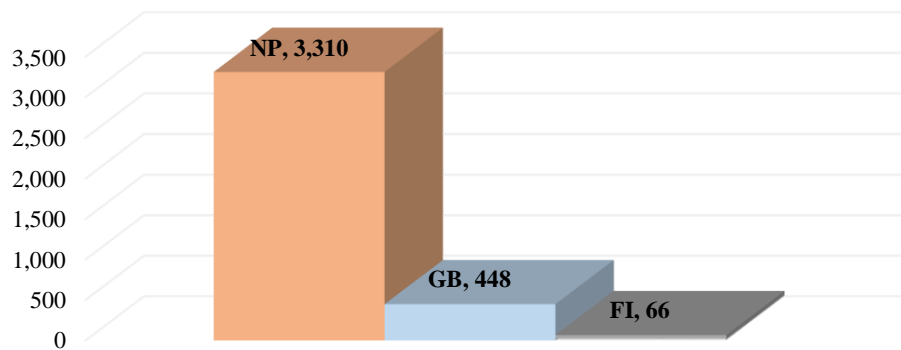

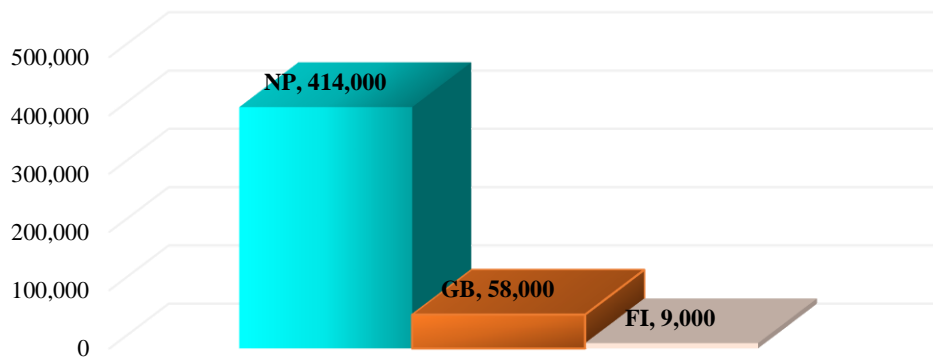
## Productivity Loss

For the period in review, the Organization accounted for 3,824 sick days at an estimated loss of \$481k. 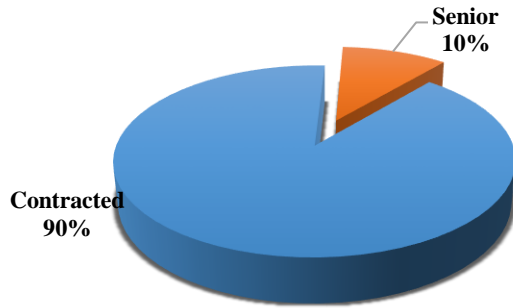
## Sick Days - District



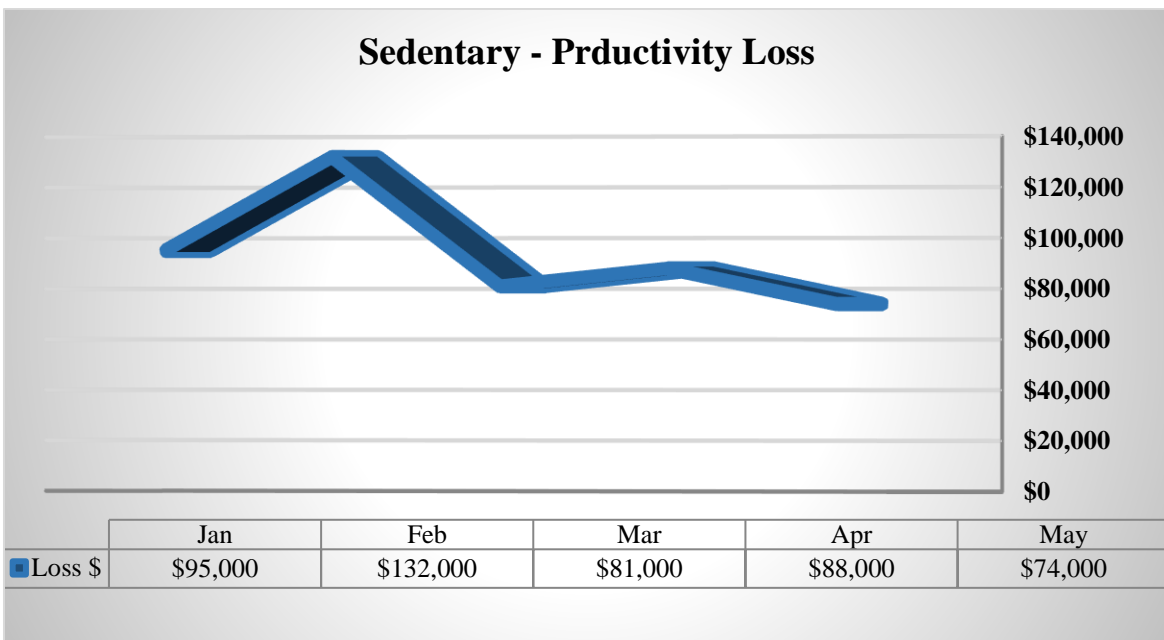
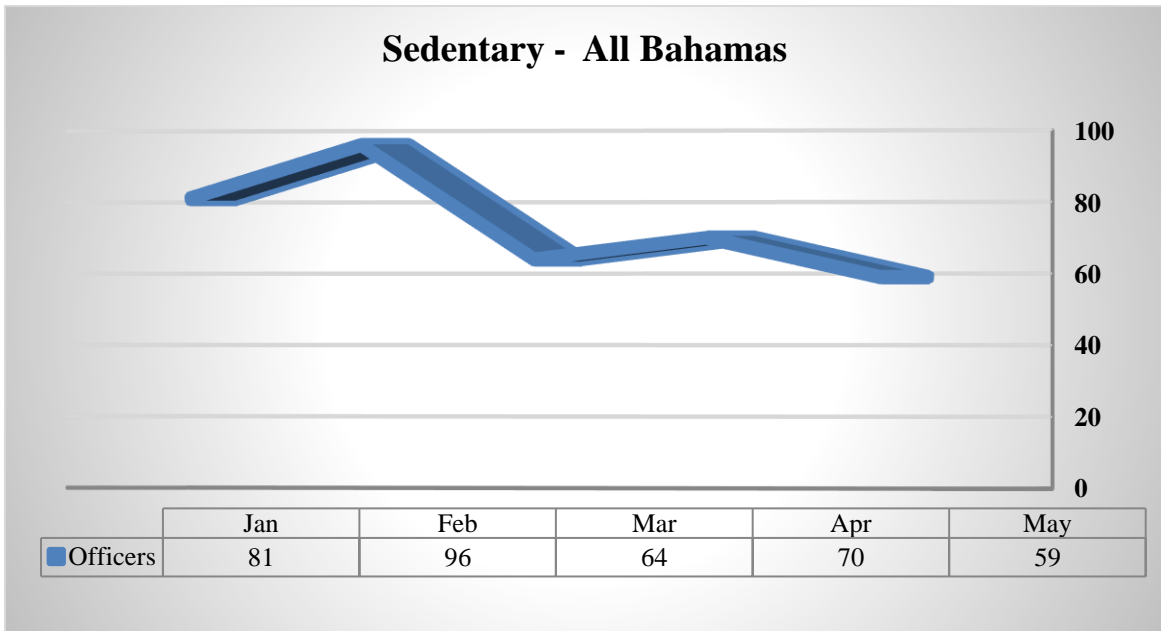
## Productivity Loss- District
