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Commissioner's Foreword

As Commissioner of Police, it is my honor to present the 2023 Annual Report for the Royal Bahamas Police Force. This report provides an overview of the prevailing crime landscape across our communities, offering insights into the challenges faced and the strategies employed to address them effectively. Moreover, the report highlights the collaborative endeavors undertaken by the Royal Bahamas Police Force in conjunction with relevant stakeholders to foster a safer and more secure environment for all inhabitants of The Bahamas.

Since stepping into the leadership role as Commissioner, I have reaffirmed my commitment to prioritizing and upholding transparency as the bedrock of my tenure. Through every word spoken and every action taken, I have held true to this ethos, as evident in our comprehensive public disclosures, community engagement initiatives, and presenting this annual report. It reinforces my pledge to openness and accountability in communicating the state of the organization's efforts and their implications for the well-being and protection of our communities.

Reflecting on the past year, the Force has encountered considerable hurdles, particularly in contending with quality-of-life offenses. These challenges have heightened apprehensions about crime levels, despite ongoing statistical evidence indicating a decline in major offenses compared to the preceding year. This highlights the complex landscape of law enforcement, where perceptions sometimes diverge from statistical realities. Recognizing the urgency of the current situation, the force acted swiftly, implementing focused initiatives to tackle not just major offenses, but also to assuage public concerns about crime. Through concerted efforts such as increased police presence, targeted operations, and proactive community involvement, we observed a marked reduction in crimes across the board in 2023, including property crimes and crimes against the person, particularly in incidents of murder, armed robbery, and housebreaking. This highlights the success of our holistic strategy and resolute focus, confirming our dedication to protecting the welfare of our communities.

The 2023 Commissioner's Policing Plan served as a strategic roadmap for our efforts throughout the year, guiding us towards tangible outcomes and results. Each priority area outlined in the plan played an integral role in shaping our approach to crime prevention and law enforcement. Here's how these priorities helped us achieve our goals:

- 1. Enhance Community Policing to Prevent Crime:** Recognizing the public as a vital asset, we took immediate steps to strengthen our ties with the communities we serve. By augmenting our manpower and expanding programs at the various urban renewal centers, we partnered with civic groups to implement a series of impactful initiatives:
 - After-school tutoring programs that offer academic support and mentorship to students from underserved communities;
 - Seniors' fitness programs aimed at promoting physical well-being, social interaction, and healthy aging among older adults;
 - Community outreach events, such as prayer walks, feeding programs, and youth mentorship sessions that fostered unity, resilience, and a sense of belonging among residents;
 - Job readiness workshops, vocational training programs, and entrepreneurship initiatives that provide residents with opportunities for economic empowerment and self-sufficiency; and



- Demolition of abandoned buildings that serve as havens for drugs and crime, removal of derelict vehicles, and other efforts aimed at enhancing community safety and cleanliness.

This approach enabled us to cultivate trust, gather valuable intelligence, and proactively address issues before they escalated. By spearheading community engagement initiatives and outreach programs, we built stronger partnerships with residents, empowering them to play an active role in crime prevention efforts.

2. Adopt a Zero-Tolerance Approach to Minor and Major Crimes:

Implementing a zero-tolerance policy sent a clear message that criminal behavior would not be tolerated, regardless of its scale. I mandated that, alongside major crimes, we prioritize targeting small offenses without exception. This included addressing traffic infractions, business liquor license violations, petty thefts, assaults and other miscellaneous crimes with the same rigor as more serious offences. This holistic strategy ensured that no crime, big or small, was overlooked. Moreover, it allowed us to maintain a proactive stance in deterring criminal activity at all levels and swiftly taking action against offenders. As a result, our community became safer for all residents and businesses.

3. Restructure Internal Processes to Support Crime Prevention Strategies:

Overhauling internal processes proved pivotal in our efforts to combat crime. Streamlining our operations enabled us to allocate resources more effectively. We optimized workflows and fostered seamless coordination between departments, instituting measures such as facilitating officer transfers to supplement human resources at different police stations and expanding the array of training courses available at our training academy. Additionally, we eliminated bureaucratic obstacles that hindered the procurement of essential resources crucial to officers executing their duties effectively. These reforms bolstered our capacity to implement immediate crime prevention strategies to our communities.

4. Collaborate with Law Enforcement Partners to Enhance Policing Capacity:

Our collaboration with various law enforcement agencies proved helpful in strengthening our crime-fighting efforts. By joining forces with partners such as the Royal Bahamas Defense Force and the US Coast Guard, we tapped into additional resources and expertise. Through joint operations and robust information-sharing initiatives, we not only amplified our collective impact but also fortified our overall policing capacity. These collaborative efforts significantly heightened our ability to address crime effectively across multiple fronts, including at sea rescues and drug seizures.

5. Implement Proactive Measures to Address Youth and Gang Violence:

Taking a proactive approach to addressing youth and gang violence involved engaging with at-risk populations, providing support and intervention programs, and targeting known gang hotspots and prolific offenders. We placed police resource officers in our high schools to provide not only safety and security but to serve as role models through positive behavior and mentorship. By addressing root causes and intervening early, we aimed to prevent the escalation of violence and reduce crime rates in affected communities.

6. Utilize Technology for Crime Prevention and Police Operations:

Embracing technology played another key role in enhancing our crime prevention and police operations. By leveraging tools such as surveillance cameras, drones, body-worn cameras and communication systems, we improved our ability to detect, investigate, and respond to criminal activity more effectively. Overall, the implementation of these priority areas enabled us to make significant strides in our mission to uphold transparency, public safety and security. Through a combination of community engagement, strategic partnerships, proactive measures, and technological advancements, we were able to address emerging challenges and achieve tangible



results in reducing crime rates and enhancing the quality of life for all visitors and residents.

Preliminary figures for 2023 indicate that overall crime throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas decreased by 21% when compared to 2022. Crimes against the person decreased by 26% and crimes against the property decreased by 19%. The rate of crime in New Providence and the Grand Bahama District decreased by 23% and 15% respectively. The Family Islands District crimes remained unchanged when compared to 2022.

In 2023, the hardworking efforts of the police resulted in the arrest of 16,406 individuals for a range of offenses across the Commonwealth of the Bahamas. Among them, 11,516 individuals were formally charged and brought before the courts, reflecting a notable 69% charge rate for major and minor crimes. This marks a 16% increase compared to the previous year, when 9,918 individuals faced charges. Additionally, there were 5,101 court returns from the Magistrates Court, including 3,477 convictions, 23 cases were discharged due to the defendant's death, 159 cases were acquitted at the end of the trial, 963 cases were discharged by the court, and 479 cases were withdrawn by the virtual complainant.

In conjunction with the strategies outlined in the Commissioner's Policing Plan 2022, the Force's remarkable accomplishments can also be attributed to a spectrum of initiatives, including a steadfast commitment to our strategy of bolstering police visibility throughout the Commonwealth. Recognizing the preventive impact of heightened police presence, we procured 100 trucks to facilitate daily operations aimed at targeting hotspots and prolific offenders, ensuring swift response and effective deterrence. This investment is complemented by our organization's allocation of over \$600,000 towards the maintenance of its current fleet of vehicles, aircraft, marine resources, police stations, and other work spaces in order to maintain compliance with the Health and Safety at Work Act.

In line with our commitment to enhancing police visibility, a pivotal aspect of our strategy encompassed the ongoing implementation of several key operations, including CEASFIRE, Secure City, and Saturation Patrol, which formed the backbone of our proactive approach to crime prevention and control. The objectives for the operations included:

- Flooding our streets with saturated patrols, particularly in hotspot areas;
- Tracking down wanted suspects for serious crimes and hauling them before court;
- Targeting and disrupting prolific gang members;
- Targeting and disrupting prolific drug peddlers within communities; and
- Engaging in intelligence-led operations using on the ground optics as well as state of the art technology.

As a direct outcome of our intensified police presence and our commitment to crime deterrence, rigorous road checks and aggressive stop-and-search tactics were employed, resulting in the removal of 355 illegal firearms and 8,995 rounds of ammunition from the streets. This led to 474 suspects charged with possession of illegal firearms. Simultaneously, our efforts to combat drug-related offenses were substantial, with the seizure of 10,385.57lbs of marijuana and 4,598.13lbs of cocaine resulting in the arrest of 1,504 suspects, of which, 1,184 were charged.

Our traffic initiatives, another key priority, bore fruit with a notable 14% decrease in traffic fatalities for the second consecutive year. Through thousands of traffic stops, strict enforcement of traffic laws, and the utilization of speed guns, we endeavored to create safer roadways. Over 25,000 fixed penalty notices were issued, and 11,023 road accident reports were investigated, contributing to a safer traffic environment for all.





Remaining at the forefront of technological advancements, our Real Time Crime Center integrated tools such as ShotSpotter, CCTV, police body-worn cameras, and Marco's Alert to facilitate crime investigations, leading to the arrest and prosecution of countless individuals involved in criminal activities. We leverage various social media platforms to share information about crime and preventive measures, actively encouraging community feedback and engagement. The deployment of drones further enhanced our crime-fighting capabilities, reflecting our commitment to staying on the cutting edge of law enforcement technology.

Investing in our human resources was pivotal in elevating our policing standards. Ongoing training initiatives have improved the professionalism and investigative abilities of our officers. Notably, the case file preparation process underwent enhancements, resulting in more successful prosecutions and higher conviction rates. The training of 735 law enforcement officers, including recruits and officers from partner agencies, exemplifies our commitment to continuous improvement. We graduated 4 squads of recruits from the training college, totaling 138 officers, and 3 squads of Police Reserves, totaling 116 officers. With these new additions, the end of 2023, RBPF manpower stood at 3,956, including 2,698 sworn officers and 1,258 police reserves, despite the loss of 94 officers due to attrition. However, challenges loom on the horizon as the Force faces further attrition, with additional officers expected to retire or commence pre-retirement leave by the end of 2024. The recruitment exercise planned for the year aims to rebuild the force's strength. Navigating these challenges requires strategic realignment of the force's ranks to efficiently manage manpower resources at all police stations throughout the Bahamas.

Building on our ongoing investments in human resources, I was pleased to announce the promotion of 721 dedicated officers to various ranks within our esteemed force as part of our attrition review. This includes the elevation of 36 Superintendents to Chief Superintendents, 85 Assistant Superintendents to Superintendents, 129 Inspectors to Assistant Superintendents, 251 Sergeants to Inspectors, 115 Corporals to Sergeants, and 105 Constables to Corporals. These promotions reflect our commitment to recognizing the hard work, dedication, and excellence demonstrated by our officers. They will significantly enhance our force's capacity to manage crime effectively by empowering these officers with greater responsibilities and leadership roles. This strategic move will bolster our operational efficiency, improve oversight and mentorship, and ensure a higher level of supervision and discipline within the ranks. I am confident that these newly promoted officers will bring renewed energy, innovative approaches, and a steadfast commitment to their roles, thereby significantly contributing to our mission of maintaining law and order and ensuring the safety and security of our communities.

Despite the organization's overall success over the year, it grapples with persistent productivity challenges stemming from sick leave and prolonged sedentary work hours. In the past year alone, the company suffered significant financial setbacks, including approximately \$7.5m in lost productivity due to sick leave, \$1.85m due to employee absences for industrial reasons, and an additional \$19k attributable to extended sedentary work periods. However, it's noteworthy that these losses have seen an increase in cost by \$1.1m compared to 2022, when overall productivity losses were valued at \$6.4m.

Our community outreach programs, including Urban Renewal, the National Crime Prevention Office, and the National Neighborhood Watch Council, played a crucial role in educating the public on road safety, domestic violence, and crime prevention. These initiatives served a dual purpose by fostering closer ties between the police and the community.

Compassion remained at the forefront of our interactions with victims of serious crimes. Through family meetings, follow-up telephone calls, and agency referrals





for counseling, we endeavored to provide support and assistance to those affected. Collaborative efforts with other law enforcement agencies, such as the Royal Bahamas Defense Force, the Bahamas Department of Immigration, and the Bahamas Customs Department, were instrumental in addressing the overall fight against crime.

As the Commissioner of Police, I am proud to highlight the significant enhancements we have made to our human resources, resulting in a positive transformation in our interactions with the public. The dedicated men and women of our organization consistently demonstrate the resilience to navigate and overcome the challenging demands placed upon them. They confront each challenge with determination, yielding commendable results. I wholeheartedly endorse and support these proactive measures. I extend my sincere gratitude to each member of the force for their commitment, dedication, and the unparalleled job they consistently deliver. Thank you all for your unwavering dedication and outstanding performance.

The dynamic nature of the environment in which the Force operates demands constant adaptation. This journey has illuminated a crucial truth: our response to crime and our engagement with the public must be in a perpetual state of refinement. The evolving landscape of 21st-century policing necessitates a deep understanding of the motivations driving criminal behavior and the application of viable techniques. Our crime-fighting strategies and policing initiatives are not static; they evolve to build safer communities through sustained public support, open discourse, and active participation.

As we forge ahead in our shared mission to cultivate a society where safety and justice are for all, my vision extends into the horizon of 2024. Policing, a collective endeavor, hinges on the unwavering support of every facet of our society and each citizen to decide that maintaining rule and order is paramount. I wholeheartedly commit to actively collaborating with the criminal justice system, civic organizations, community leaders, and all those fervently yearn to witness our nation prosper. The Royal Bahamas Police Force stands resolute in its duty, poised not to retreat but to fortify its efforts with even greater boldness, reaching beyond conventional bounds to safeguard peace for all who visit and call this land home. To realize this commitment, I have identified 7 pivotal priority areas that will steer and strengthen the force's efforts, including:

- Priority 1: Expand Urban Renewal Initiatives to Bolster “Clear, Hold and Build” Strategy;
- Priority 2: Infuse Community Participation in Crime Prevention;
- Priority 3: Activate Comprehensive Gang Intervention and Rehabilitation Protocol to Prevent Recruitment;
- Priority 4: Amplify School-Based Policing using Crime Prevention Initiatives to Protect at-Risk Youth;
- Priority 5: Coordinate Intelligence Sharing and Collaboration to Aid Police Operations, Avert Criminal Risk and Prevent Crime;
- Priority 6: Dynamic Integration of Police Technologies to Prevent and Detect Crime; and
- Priority 7: Enhance Prosecutorial Product to Increase Conviction Rate and Reduce Recidivism.

With these priorities shaping our journey ahead, I am confident that we will continue to make substantial progress in creating a safer, more prosperous future that welcomes all who visit and reside in our communities.

Organization and Administration

The Royal Bahamas Police Force is commanded by the Commissioner of Police, Clayton Fernander, QPM. The Commissioner is supported by the Deputy Commissioner of Police, Mr. Leamond Deleveaux, who is charged with Discipline, Prosecutions, Family Islands and Grand Bahama. The Commissioner is further supported by 1 Senior Assistant Commissioner and 12 Assistant Commissioners of Police.

The responsibility for the daily management of the Force is shared between the members of the Senior Executive Leadership Team under the following restructured portfolios:

The Force remained divided into 3 districts including:

- New Providence District;
- Grand Bahama and the Northern Bahamas (including Bimini and Abaco); and
- The Family Islands District (including the Central and Southern Bahamas).

The strength of the Royal Bahamas Police Force as at December 31, 2023 stood at 3,956 members. This figure includes 2,698 sworn police officers, 1,258 police reserves.

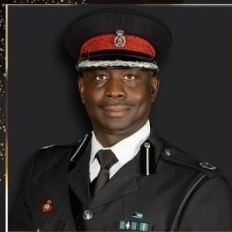

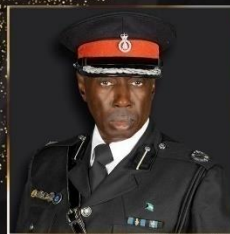

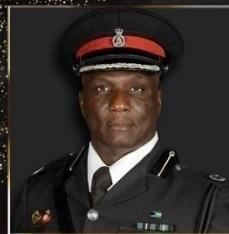

The Research and Policy Branch (RPB) is responsible for the organizational growth of the Royal Bahamas Police Force through empirical research, policy development and a systematic review of functional processes in an overall effort to improve procedural efficiencies and effectiveness.

The Branch is responsible for amalgamating the Force's Annual Reports, Productivity Reports, Deficiency Reports and other Special Reports requested by the Commissioner of Police. The daily operation of the Research and Policy Branch is headed by Chief Superintendent Ricardo J. Adderley, who is assisted by 1 Assistant Superintendent, 2 Inspectors, 1 Sergeant, 2 Corporals, 8 Constables and 1 Civilian.

For the period in review, the Branch recorded a total of 576 certified sick days at a productivity loss of \$150,528. The Division also recorded 365 industrial sick days.

2023 vs 2022

Preliminary figures for 2023 indicate that major crimes decreased by 21% with 3,153 cases, compared to 3,979 in 2022. There were regional decreases in New Providence and Grand Bahama and the Northern Bahamas at rates of 23% and 15% respectively, compared to 2022. The rate of crime in the Family Islands District remain unchanged when compared to 2022.

Crimes against the property decreased by 19% with 2,356 incidents, compared to 2,907 in 2022. There were regional decreases in crimes against the property across the board for 2023 at rates of 22% in New Providence, 10% in Grand Bahama and 4% in the Family Islands District. Crimes against the person decreased by 26%, with 797 incidents, compared to 1,072 in 2022. There were regional decreases at rates of 27% in New Providence and 35% in Grand Bahama. Crimes against the person in the Family Islands District increased by 33%.

Homicides decreased by 14% with 110 incidents, compared to 128 in 2022. There were 106 murders in New Providence, 3 in Grand Bahama and 1 in the Family Islands District, with an overall solvency rate of 65%. Victims between the ages of 18 and 45 represent 89% of all homicides. Retaliation, gang and conflict were the most common motives for murder, representing 65% collectively. Based on preliminary figures, homicides were more likely to occur on a Saturday and Sunday than any other day of the week. Homicides were more prevalent in the **Southern, Southeastern** and **Southern Divisions**, accounting for 41% of the overall total. Firearms were used in the commission of 98 homicides and fatal gunshot wounds remain the leading cause of death in these matters.

Armed Robberies decreased by 34% with 368 incidents, compared to 555 in 2022. Armed robberies were more prevalent in the **Southwestern** and **Southeastern Divisions**, accounting for 37% of the overall total. Based on preliminary figures, armed robberies were more likely to occur on a Thursday and Sunday than any other day of the week and these incidents peak between the hours of 5pm and 11pm. Most armed robberies occurred at the street level, residences and at businesses respectively. Firearms continue to be the weapon of choice for the commission of armed robberies. Notably, there were 171 vehicles taken in the commission of armed robbery incidents for 2023. Twelve percent of vehicles taken during armed robberies were recovered. Males represent the highest percentage of victims of armed robbery at 60%, compared to female victims at 40%.

Robberies decreased by 44% with 70 incidents, compared to 124 in 2022. Robberies were more prevalent in the **Central, Southeastern** and **South Central Divisions**, accounting for 50% of the overall total. Based on preliminary figures, robberies were more likely to occur on a Friday and Sunday than any other day of the week and these incidents peak between the hours of 8am and 4pm. Males represent the highest percentage of victims at 67%, compared to female victims at 33%.

Stolen vehicles decreased by 22% with 257 incidents, compared to 330 in 2022. **Nissans** were the most targeted vehicles of choice, representing 36% of all vehicles stolen. The Nissan Note and March were the predominant models stolen, while residences were the most targeted locations. Stolen vehicles were mostly reported in the **Southwestern Division**, accounting for 15% of the overall total. Thirty-six percent of all stolen vehicles in 2023 were recovered.

Stealing from vehicles decreased by 38% with 253 incidents, compared to 410 in 2022. The most frequent items stolen included cash, cellular phones, and personal effects. Nissan Notes were mostly targeted, with Honda Accords trending close behind. Based on preliminary figures, stealing from vehicles were more likely to occur on a Saturday than any other day of the week. Stealing from vehicle cases were mostly reported in the **South Central Division**, accounting for 18% of recorded cases.

Housebreakings decreased by 27% with 372 incidents, compared to 507 in 2022. The **New Providence District** accounted for 254 or 68% of all housebreakings, most of which occurred in the **Southwestern Division**, accounting for 19% of all cases. **Grand Bahama**, including **Abaco and Bimini**, accounted for 59 or 16% of housebreakings, most of which occurred in **Abaco** and the **Southwestern Divisions**, accounting for 36 incidents. The **Family Islands District** accounted for 59 or 16%, most of which occurred in Andros with 21 incidents.

Shop Breakings decreased by 28% with 375 incidents, compared to 524 in 2022. The **New Providence District** accounted for 239 or 64% of all Shop Breakings, most of which occurred in the **Northeastern Division**, accounting for 15% of all cases. **Grand Bahama**, including **Abaco and Bimini**, accounted for 62 or 17% of Shop Breakings, most of which occurred in the **Central and Abaco Divisions**, accounting for 31 incidents. The **Family Islands District** accounted for 74 or 20%, most of which occurred in Eleuthera, Exuma and Andros with a collective 54 incidents. Based on preliminary figures, Shop Breakings were more likely to occur on a Saturday than any other day of the week.

For the period in review, a total of 355 **firearms** and 8,995 rounds of ammunition were discovered and/or seized throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. As a result, 474 persons were charged with possession of illegal firearms. Additionally, **ShotSpotter** detected a total of 1,357 gunshot incidents, consisting of 789 multiple shots, 441 single shots and 127 probable shot incidents, totaling 4,989 rounds discharged.

Notably, the officers of the Royal Bahamas Police Force conducted 16,406 field check patrols, 45,655 stop and search profiles, 683 road checks and 668 search warrants throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. As a result of these efforts, 16,950 persons were arrested for various major and minor offences. Of this number, 11,516 persons were charged and placed before the Court, representing a 69% charge rate. This figure represents a 16% increase over 2022 when 9,918 persons charged. There were 5,101 court returns from the Magistrates Court including 3,477 convictions, 23 cases were discharged due to the defendant's death, 159 cases were acquitted at the end of trial, 963 cases were discharged by the court and 479 cases were withdrawn by the virtual complainant.

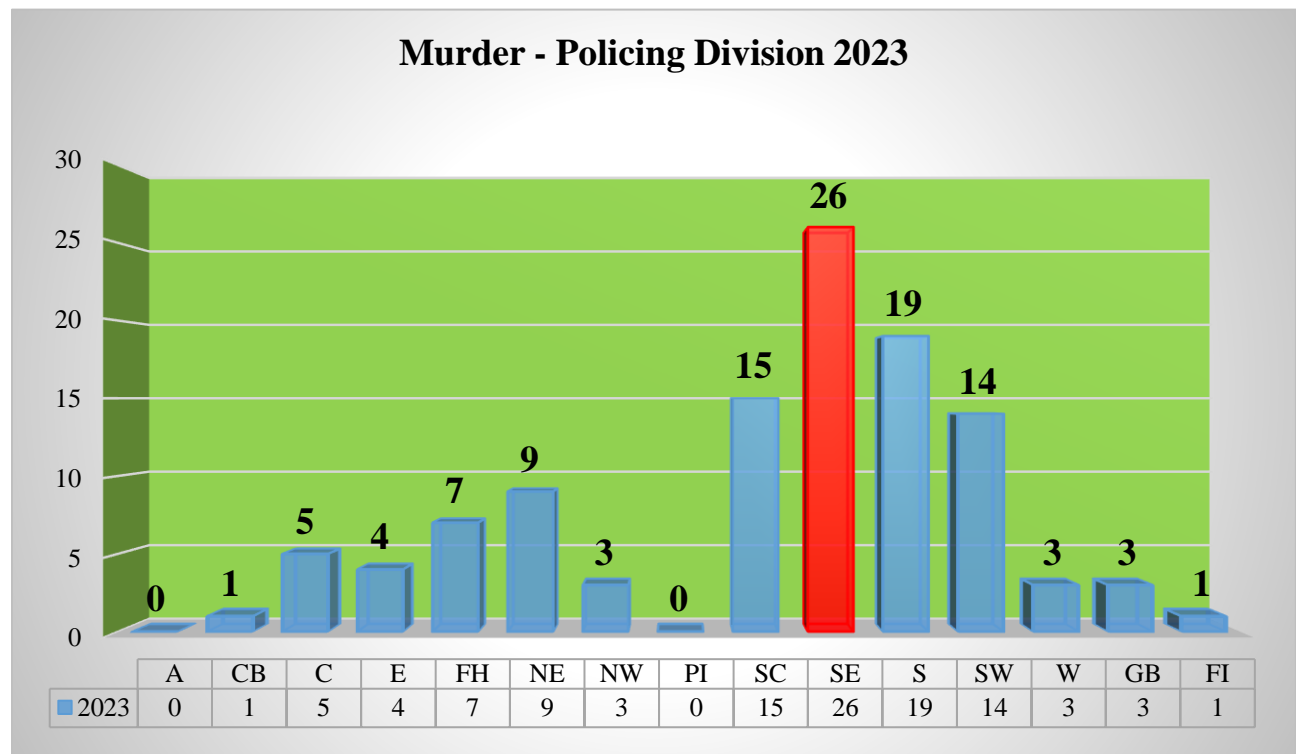

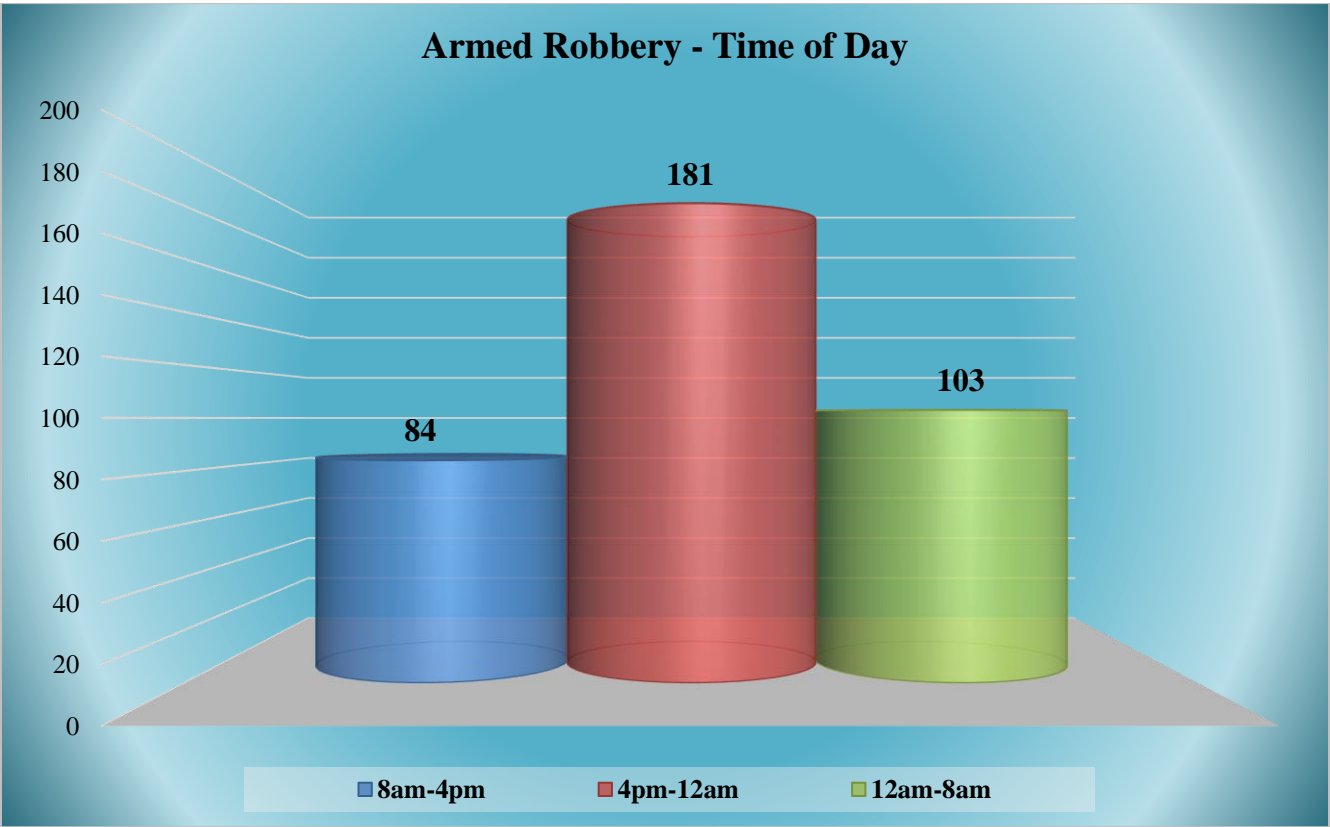


Armed Robbery - Police Divisions



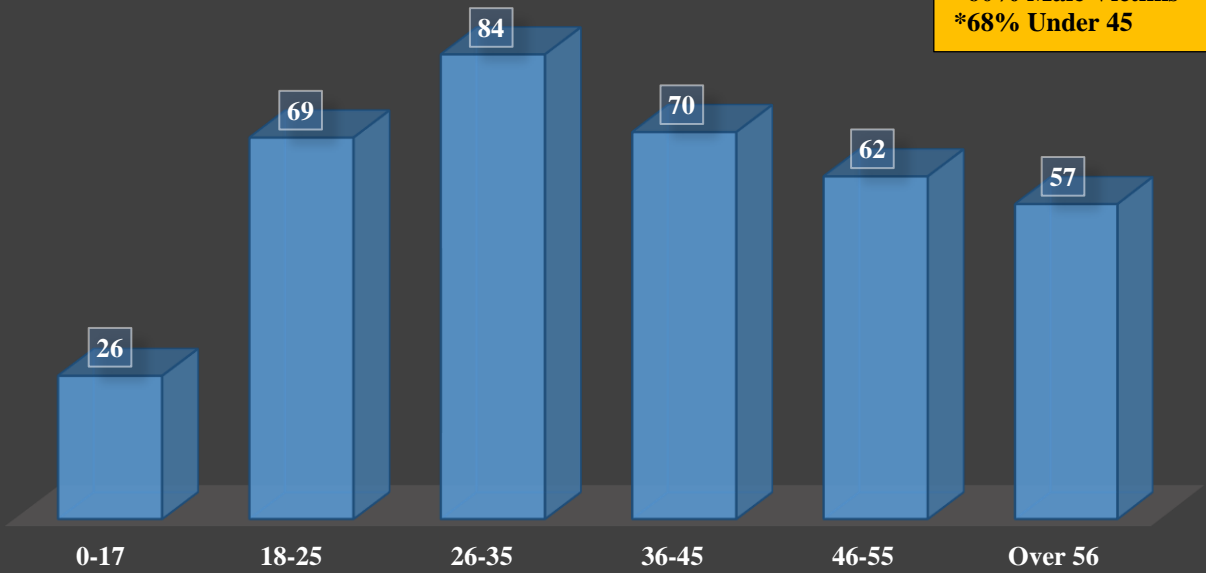
Armed Robbery - Weapon Used





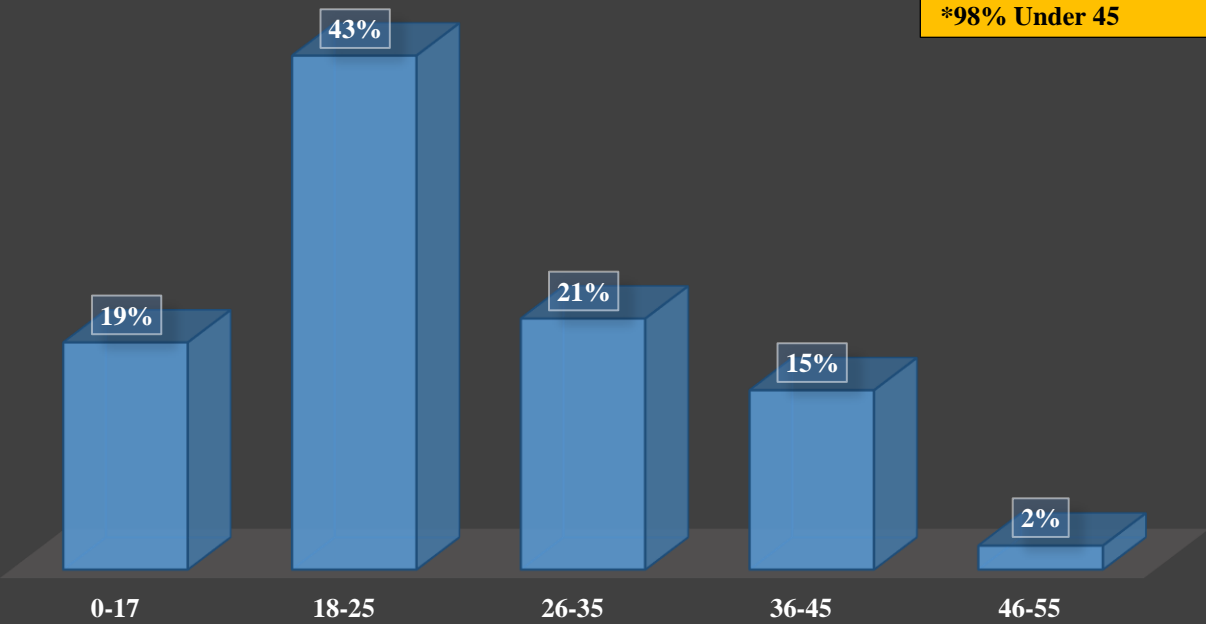
Armed Robbery Victim Age Demographics

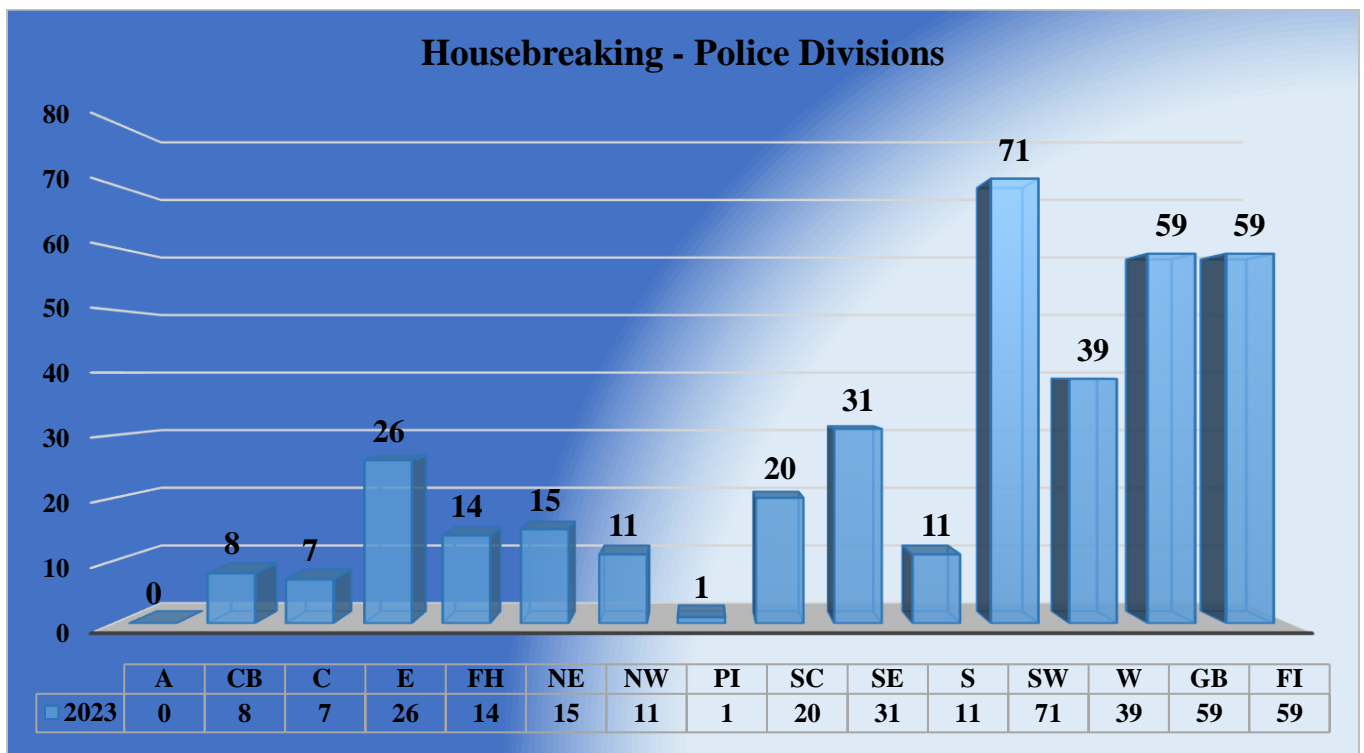
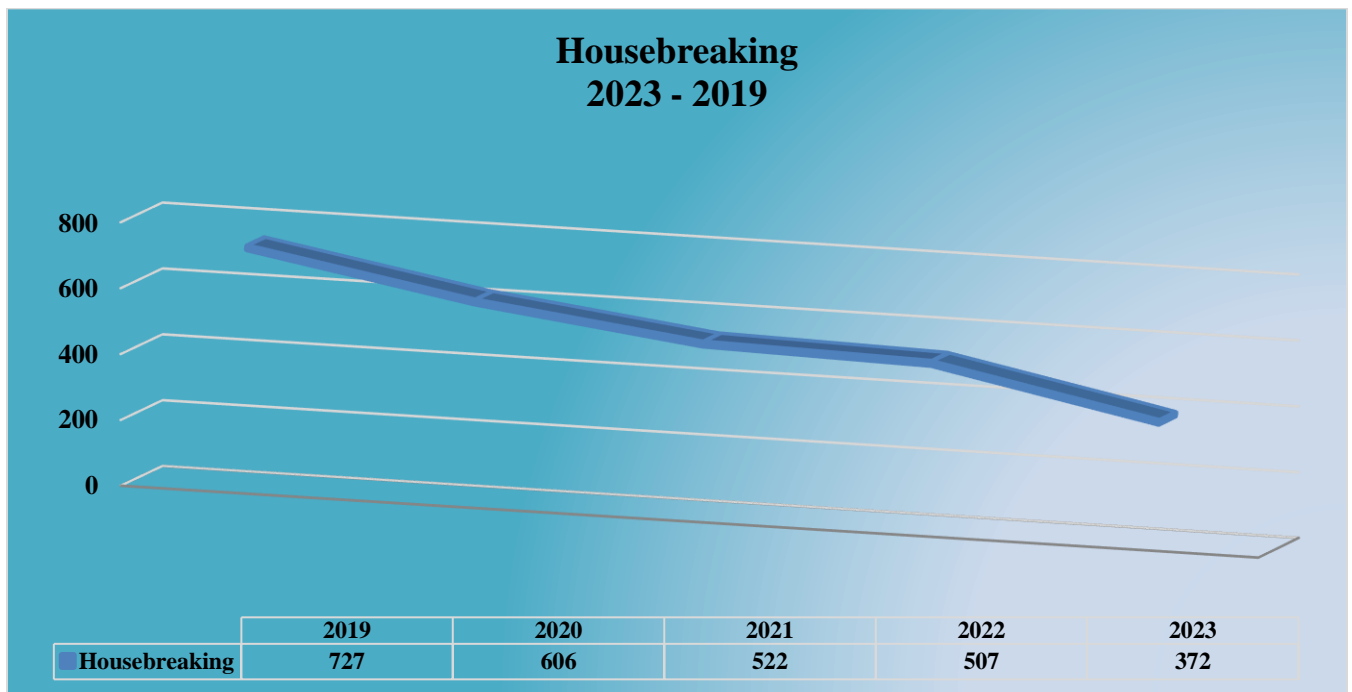
Armed Robbery Suspect Age Demographics

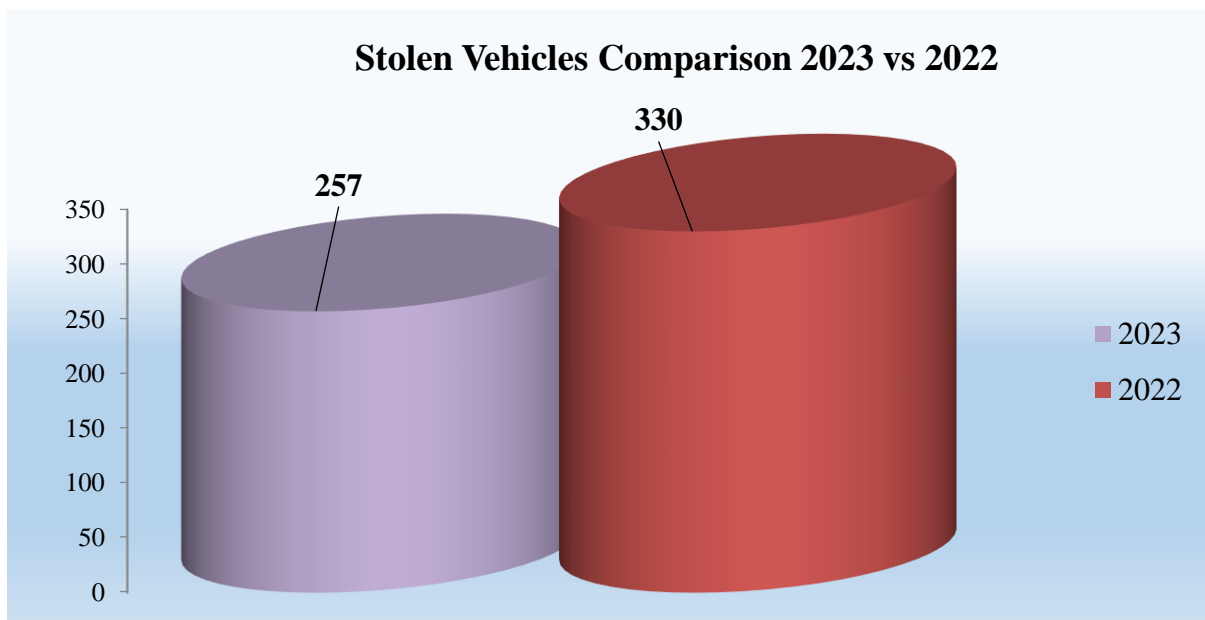

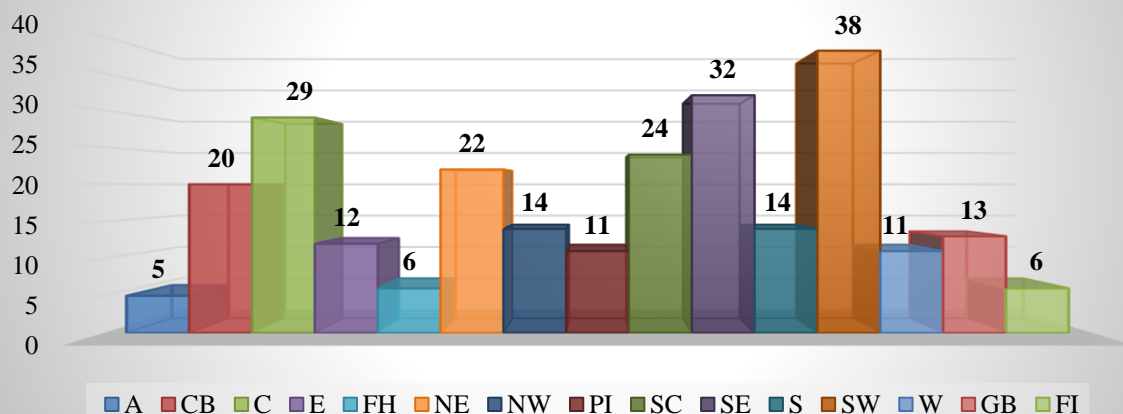

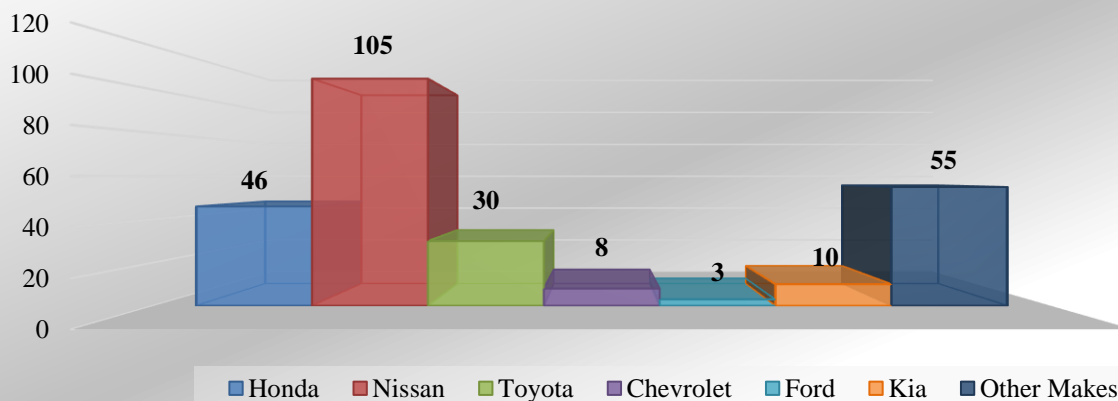

Stolen Vehicles - Police Division 2023

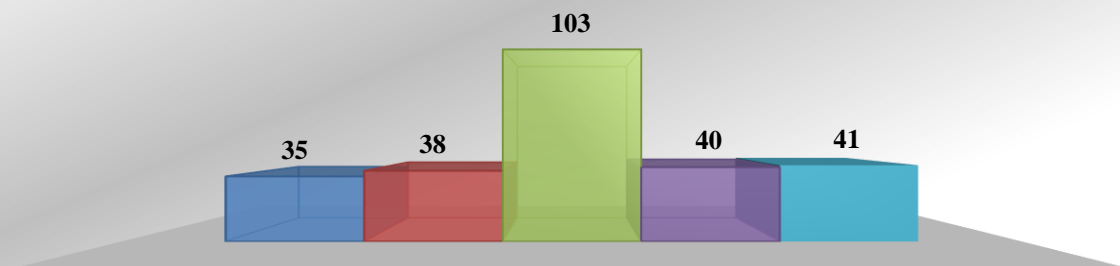


Stolen Vehicles - Make 2023

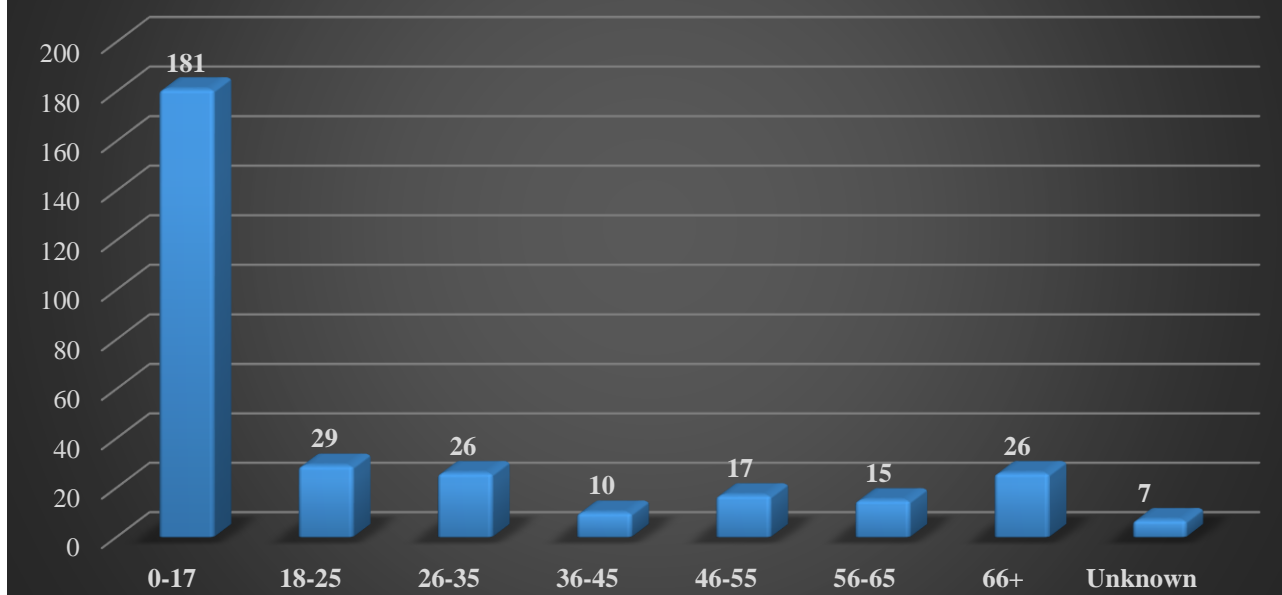

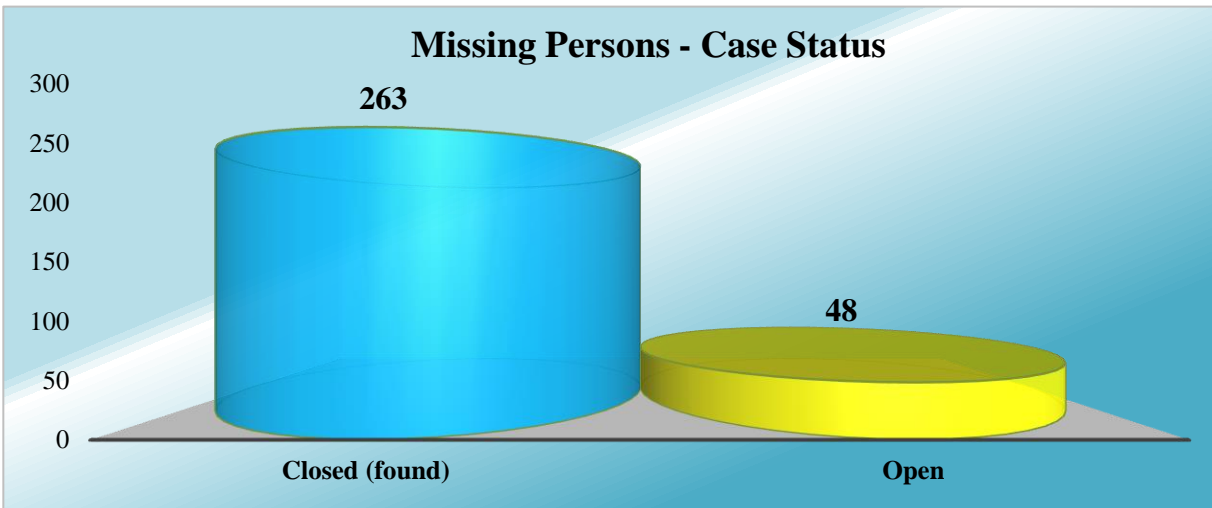


Missing Person Age Demographics

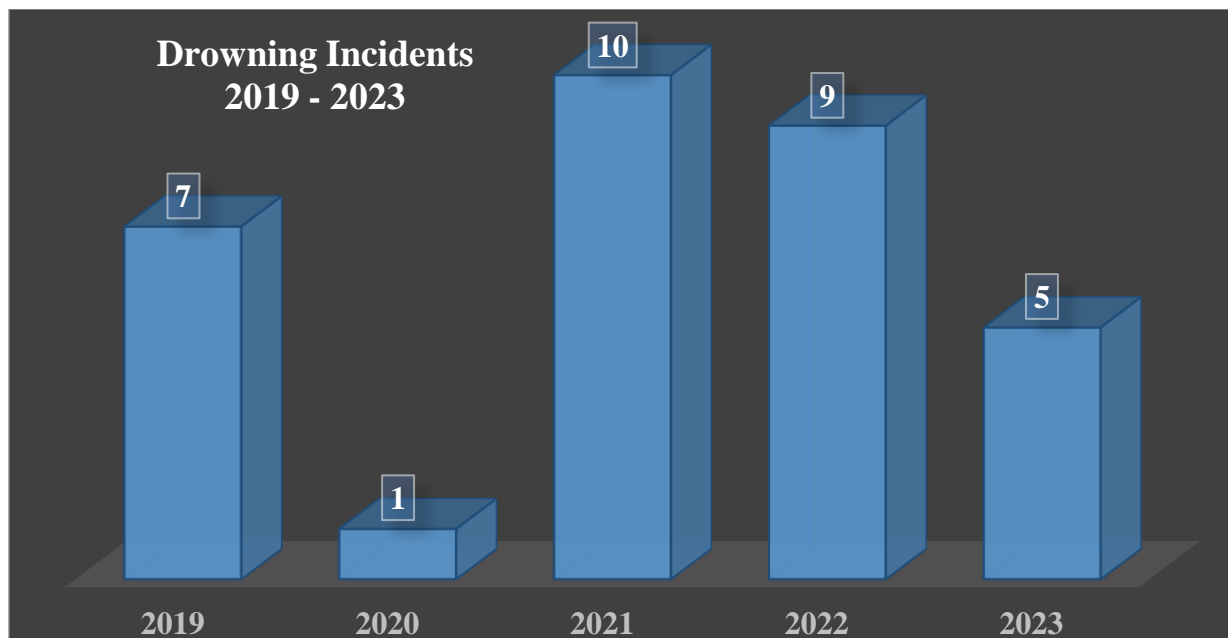

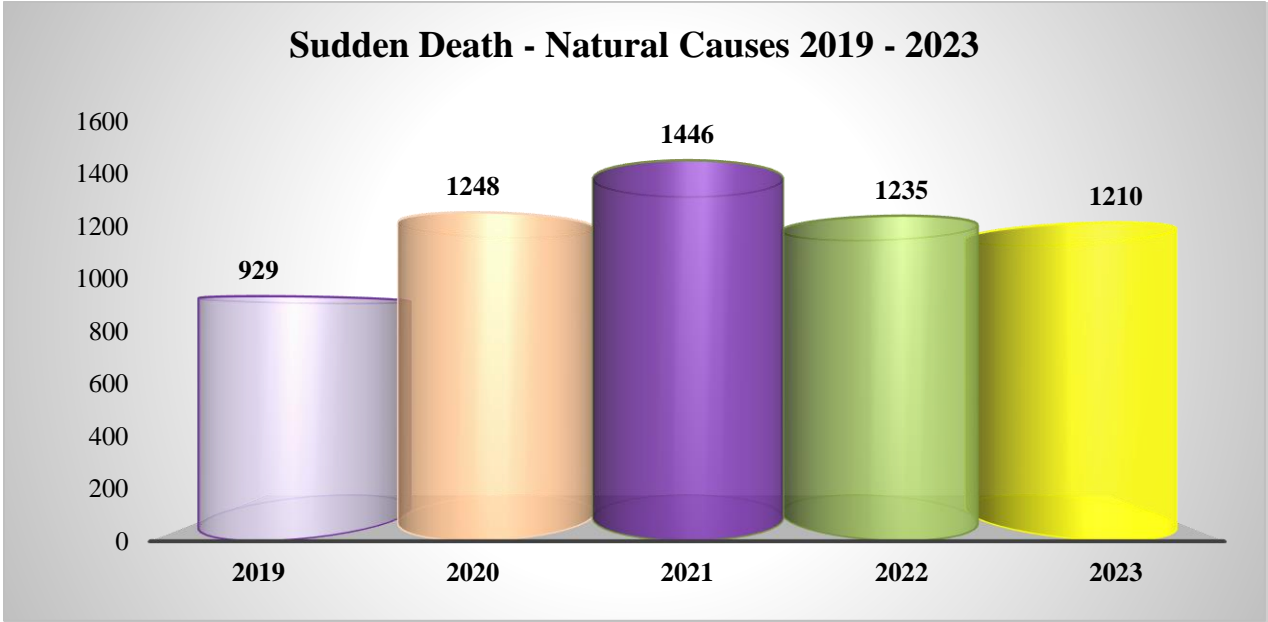

Sudden Death – Natural Causes **2023 vs 2022**

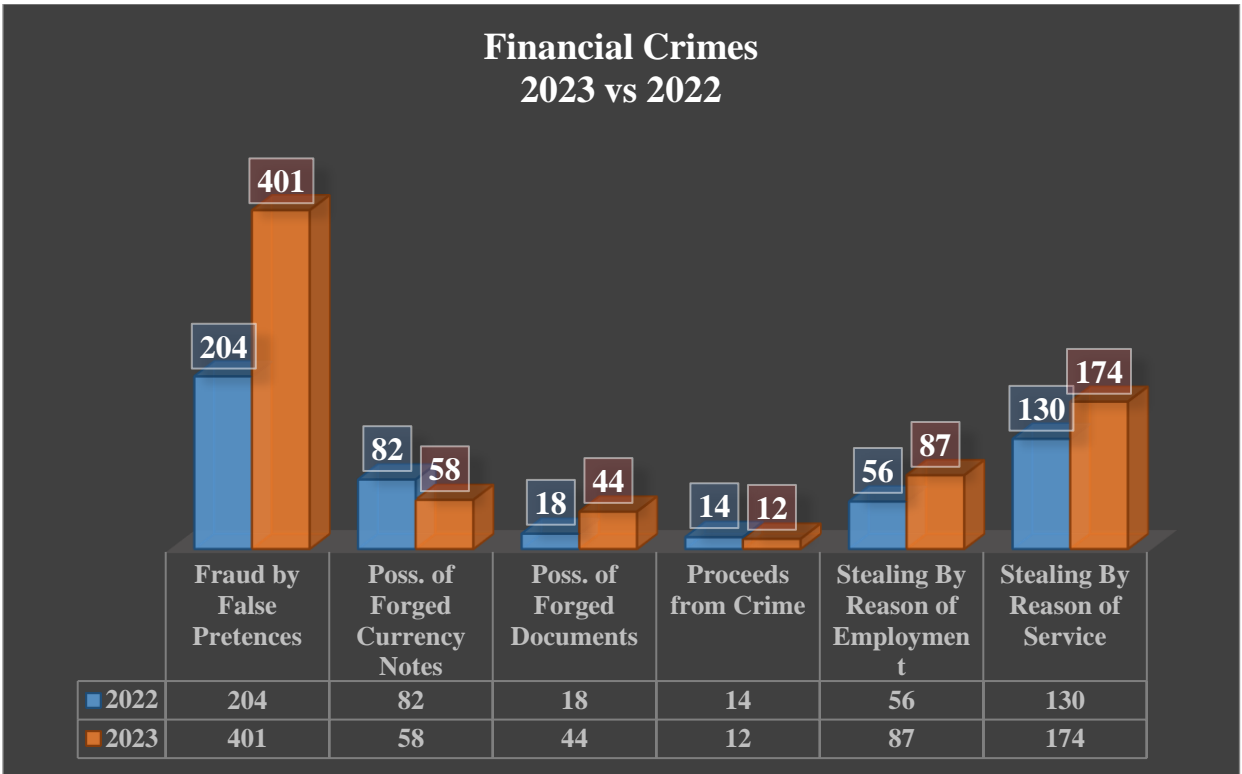
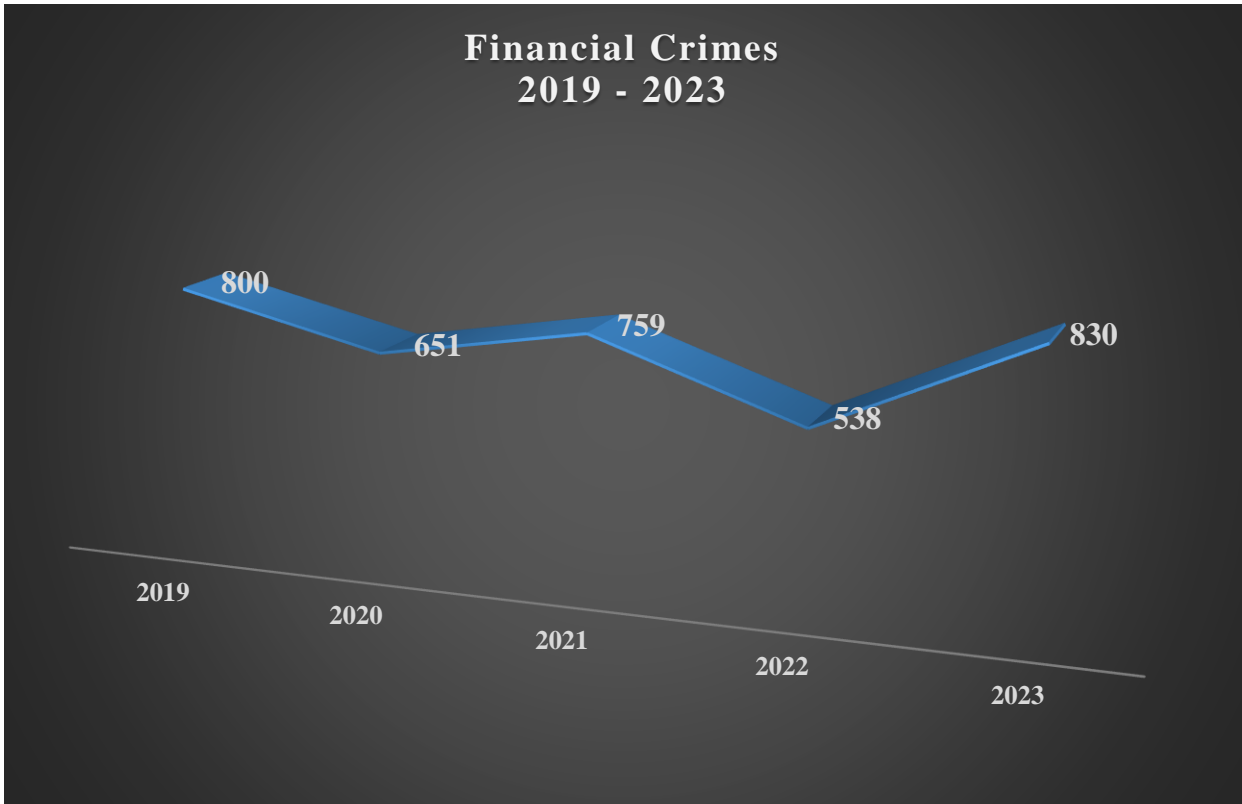

Police Activity

Persons Arrested and Charged

Persons Arrested Analysis

For the period January 1 to December 31, 2023, the police arrested a total of 16,950 persons for various major and minor offences throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas. Males accounted for 87% or 14,708 arrests and females accounted for 13% or 2,242 arrests. Accordingly, 11,516 persons were charged and placed before the Court. Overall, 68% of all persons arrested were charged.

The **New Providence District** accounted for 73% or 12,285 of all persons arrested. Males accounted for 63% or 10,659 arrests and females accounted for 10% or 1,626 arrests. Adult males accounted for 61% or 10,342 arrests, and juvenile males accounted for 2% or 317 arrests. Similarly, adult females accounted for 9% or 1,564 arrests and juvenile females accounted for less than 1% or 62 arrests.

The **Grand Bahama District including Abaco and Bimini** accounted for 17% or 2,925 of all persons arrested. Males accounted for 15% or 2,562 arrests and females accounted for 2% or 363 arrests. Adult males accounted for 15% or 2,460 arrests and juvenile males accounted for 1% or 102 arrests. Similarly, adult females accounted for 2% or 340 arrests and juvenile females accounted for less than 1% or 23 arrests.

The **Family Islands District** accounted for 10% or 1,740 of all persons arrested. Males accounted for 9% or 1,487 arrests and females accounted for 1% or 253 arrests. Adult males accounted for 8% or 1,399 arrests and adult females accounted for 1% or 240 arrests. Similarly, Juvenile males accounted for less than 1% or 88 arrests and juvenile females accounted for less than 1% or 13 of the arrests.

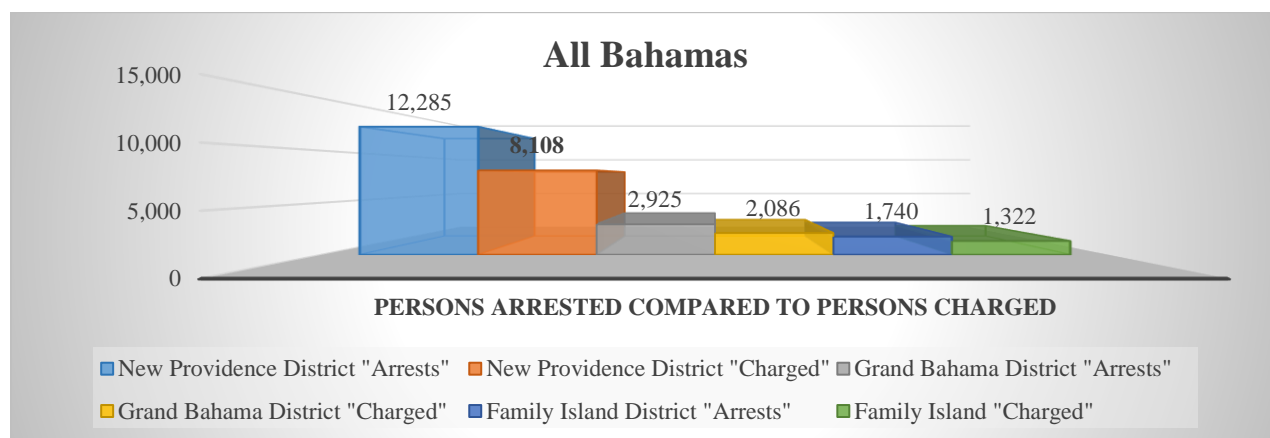
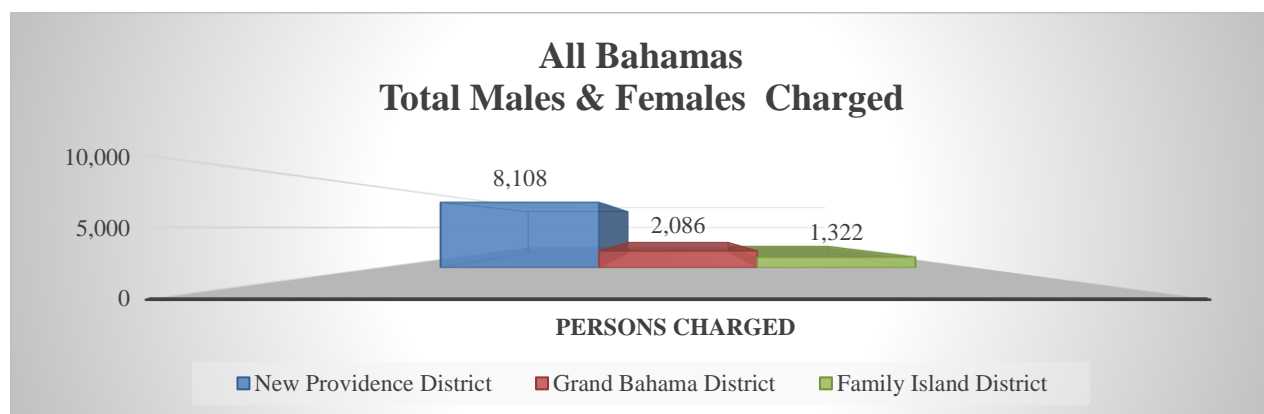
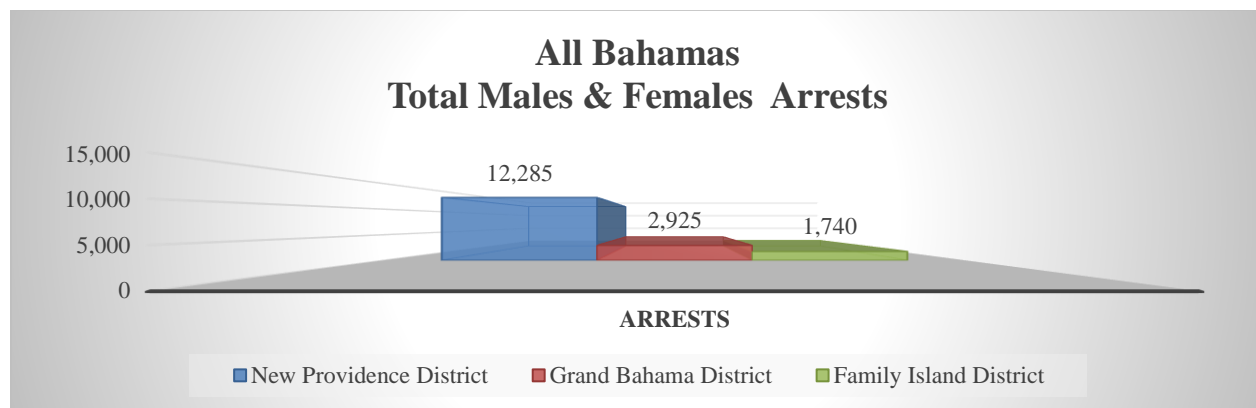

Adult males accounted for 83% or 9,531 persons charged and juvenile males accounted for 3% or 315 persons charged. Adult females accounted for 14% or 1,608 of persons charged and juvenile females accounted for less than 1% or 62 of females charged. The New Providence District accounted for 70% or 8,108 persons charged. Grand Bahama and the Northern Bahamas District accounted for 18% or 2,086 persons charged. The Family Islands District accounted for 12% or 1,322 persons charged.

Quality Control Unit

The Quality Control Unit (QCU) was established in January 2023 to provide resolute data assurances that are reliable and trustworthy to support crime prevention initiatives and enhance human resource management. The Unit ensures data integrity standards are maintained at the highest levels within the Crime Management Module of the AS400 database.

The Unit functions as a regulatory data authority liaising with all police divisions throughout the Commonwealth of The Bahamas in order to vet new and existing data entered into the AS400 database as well as to resolve any ambiguities in data entries.

The daily operation of the Quality Control Unit is headed by Chief Superintendent Ricardo J. Adderley, who is assisted by 2 Inspectors, 2 Sergeants, 1 Corporal, 3 Constables and 1 Police Reserve.

The responsibilities of the Unit include, but are not limited to:

- Tracking all entries into the AS400 database on a daily basis and request feedback on updates initiated and/or investigated by any division within the Force
- Requesting updates on cases that are left pending and/or have obvious lines of investigations that have not been updated into the AS400 database;
- Tracking and reporting on General Information, Other Activity, Miscellaneous Offences, and Assistance Requested to guide divisions in curing misclassifications; and
- Monitoring misclassifications and providing feedback on resolution to all cases.

QCU Activity

Police Activity
